Fort Union Trading Post National Historic Site

A reconstruction of a non-military fur trading post brings to life a bustling trade hub from the 1800s. *(photo above)*

Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site

Earthlodge village remains and a reconstructed earthlodge interpret the way of life of three Northern Plains tribes. *(photo right)*



Theodore Roosevelt National Park

A young Theodore Roosevelt learned the value of conservation while ranching in North Dakota's rugged and beautiful badlands. Preserved in his honor, this colorful landscape and its abundant wildlife provide inspiration and enjoyment for visitors today. *(photo below)*
