Engaging Youth in National Parks

At Point Reyes National Seashore a collaboration with Tomales Bay Youth Center and Point Reyes National Seashore Association engages firstgeneration immigrant youths with

recreational and educational activities at the park. This exposes them to career pathways within the National Park Service and conservation fields and helps increase their connection and enjoyment of their local park, while fostering leadership skills.



Improving People's Health

A program supported by friends like you at Saint Croix National Scenic Riverway partnered with Burnett Medical Center to offer a series of "Healthy Parks, Healthy People"

activities to raise awareness among local communities about nearby outdoor recreation opportunities and the associated health benefits. Healthcare providers actually prescribed outdoor activities to their patients to help improve the overall community's health.



Protecting Wildlife


In Bryce Canyon National Park, Utah, a project supported by friends like you is helping protect American black bears by monitoring their movement and expanding educational programs within the park about these majestic

Preserving Our Nation's History


Kenai Fjords National Park and Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve in Alaska have a rich human inhabitant history that dates back centuries if not millennia. Special projects at both parks are working to rescue and protect irreplaceable historic archaeological sites on their eroding coastlines — thanks to the generosity of National Park Foundation supporters.



Making History Come Alive for Students

Thanks to support from National Park Foundation supporters, public school students in York, Pennsylvania, visited the Eisenhower National Historic Site

to learn about General and President Eisenhower's life and work through hands-on field study and role-playing. This project helped students connect with their nation's history in a meaningful way, while learning about the land and agriculture.



Restoring **Urban Parks**

An urban project in **Dumbarton** Oaks Park helped ecologically and culturally restore the first 1.5 acres of the only remaining wild land garden of Beatrix Farrand, America's first

successful female landscape architect. Those who participated in the project learned about the challenges of climate change, storm water, invasive species, and the changing ways people use urban parks.



Connecting Students to Defining Moments of the Past

At Moores Creek National Battlefield, North Carolina high school students learned to interpret colonial history through the arts. After field trips to

the park, students in drama, art, band, and chorus wrote, promoted, and produced a play titled, "The Battle of Moores Creek Bridge: Voices From Beyond the Grave." The play was presented at the park to all 8th graders in the high school, families, friends, and the general public.
