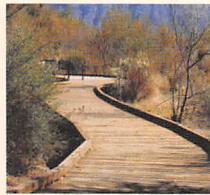

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Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge, located 30 minutes from Death Valley National Park, is the largest remaining oasis in the Mojave Desert with at least 26 plant and animal species found nowhere else on the planet.

Our accessible boardwalks offer unique experiences. Crystal Spring Boardwalk leads to a brilliant blue spring flowing at 2,800 gallons of water per minute.

Journey back to the days of the Wild West inside the historic stone cabin of infamous gunslinger Jack Longstreet.

Point of Rocks is a visitor favorite, complete with a picnic area, viewing scopes, and Kings Spring, the home of a rare species of pupfish.

The refuge is open daily from sunrise to sunset.
