Trails need repairing, wildlife needs protecting, historic structures are crumbling... Join the Public Land Corps and personally having a role in helping to restore, protect, and rehabilitate your national parks. And have fun doing so.

WHAT WOULD I DO?

Public Land Corps members conduct conservation projects to help restore, protect and rehabilitate facilities, structures and resources that need repair. Members are recruited and selected through non-profit organizations.

You'll work on projects such as constructing trails, assisting with wildlife research, restoring habitats, repairing historic buildings, or removing exotic plants.

Aside from conservation projects, you will learn about environmental issues, as well as conservation and preservation efforts.

DO I QUALIFY?

To participate in the Public Land Corps, you must be:

- * Between 16-25 years old.
- * Either U.S. Citizen or legal resident.

HOW DO I APPLY?

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?
