



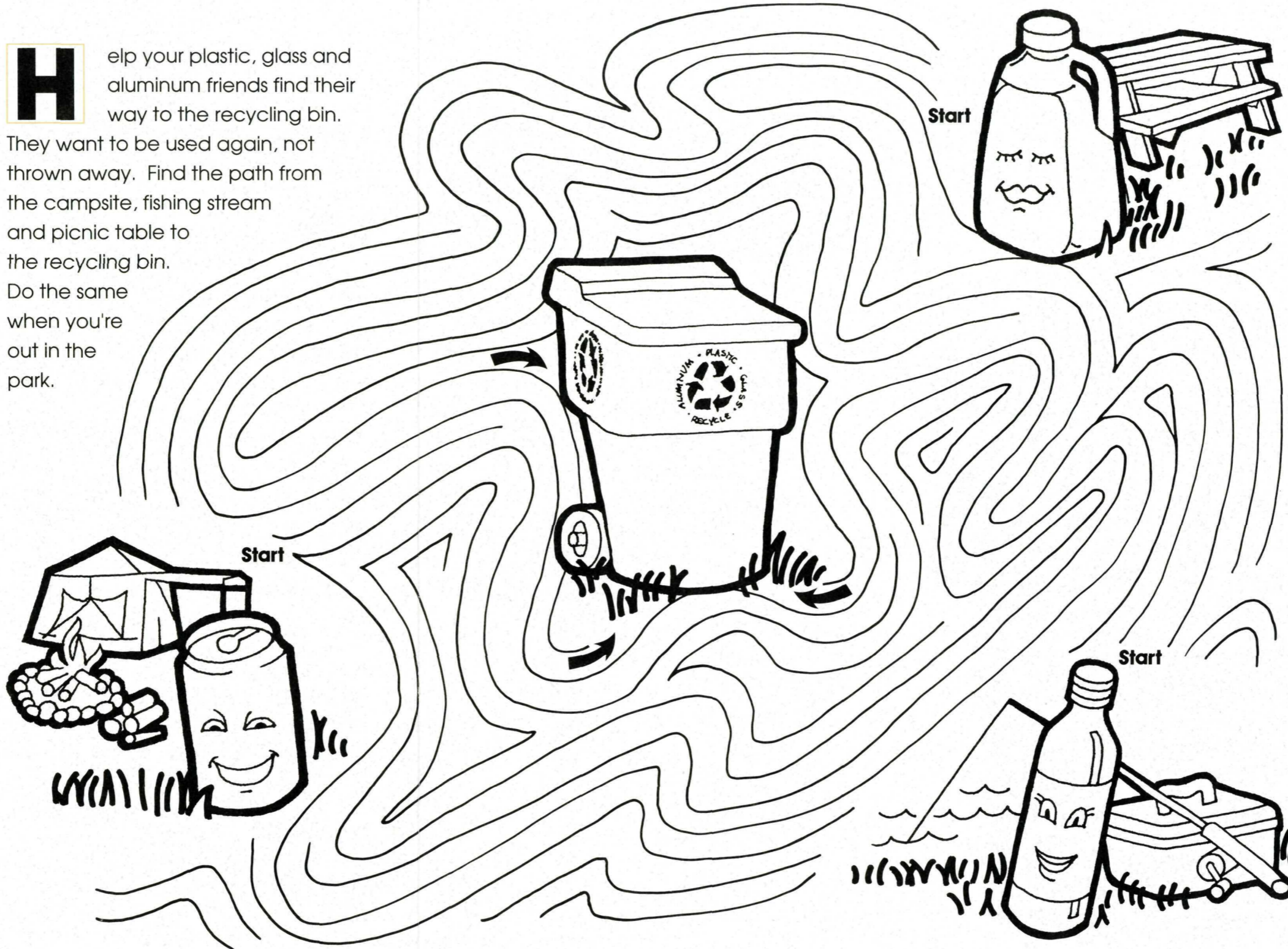

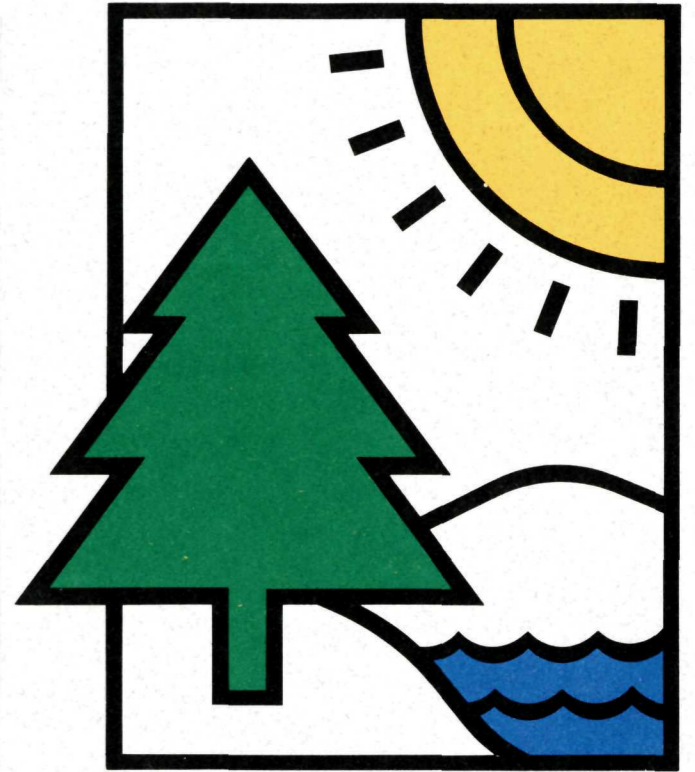

It's as Easy as a Walk in the Park

The National Park Service asks you to place your recyclables - plastics, glass and aluminum - in the specially designated recycling containers located



throughout the park. Food, paper and diapers should be placed in garbage cans. Your participation is important to the park and our environment.

Recycling really is "as easy as a walk in the park." Here's how easy: Look for one of the many convenient recycling bins, generally located near the park's garbage containers. Recycling bins are the ones with the green strip of recycling symbols.

If you have only a few throw-aways, separate the plastic, glass and aluminum items from other materials and place them in a recycling bin. Food, diapers and other materials go in the garbage.

If you're camping or storing waste in the car, save your plastic, glass and aluminum in a separate recycling bag and food, diapers, paper and other materials in a garbage bag. Then, simply drop the bags in the appropriate containers.



The plastic soda bottle you place in a recycling bin can be turned into the filling for jackets and sleeping bags. Your glass bottles and aluminum cans will be reused rather than taking up space in a landfill.

Materials we once simply discarded are really resources that can become useful once again. Why waste them?

Why Recycle? Because it's critical to the improvement of our environment. And, it's important to the park you're visiting. Recycling is a way to



conserve renewable resources and reduce waste. It's a way you can Take Pride in America at home and while visiting your national parks!

The National Park Service has begun collecting plastic, glass and aluminum in high-visitation parks like this one to demonstrate the importance, ease and effectiveness of recycling.

Paper, which also can be recycled, may be collected as the program expands. And, just as importantly, we hope you will recycle at home and where you work.
