## Harman Farm Preserved

In March, Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar announced that the National Park Service (NPS) acquired 95 acres of the former Gettysburg Country Club property. The land – now known by its historic name, the Emanuel Harman Farm – is where major fighting occurred on the first day of battle, and is now part of Gettysburg National Military Park.

"Gettysburg will always have a sacred place in America's heritage for the pivotal role it played in our nation's history and for the enormity of the sacrifice that took place here," Secretary Salazar said. "With the addition of the Harman Farm to the Gettysburg National Military Park, we are able to include another important chapter in the story that helped shape our country."

During the battle, Confederate Brigades advanced and retreated over the fields of the Harman farm to attack Union positions on McPherson and Seminary Ridges. In the 1950's the property was developed into the Gettysburg Country Club and operated as such until the club closed in 2008.

The NPS tried for almost 20 years to acquire this property for preservation purposes; however, offers to the country club owners and the Susquehanna Bank (which foreclosed on the property in 2008) were declined. In March 2010, a developer bought the property and created a development concept plan for over 200 housing units.

The Conservation Fund, a nonprofit dedicated to protecting important places across America, successfully negotiated with the developer to acquire fee title to the 95-acres and subsequently conveyed it to the NPS.

# A Look at Upcoming Projects

Monuments and Cannon - Park staff at the cannon shop continues to rehabilitate cannon carriages in the facility rented by the Gettysburg Foundation. We are on carriage #277 and #278 out of 412. Look for newly restored carriages to be placed on the field this spring.

The monument preservation branch has also been working on contracts to repair and restore missing features on numerous monuments, including: 18th Pa.; 56th Pa.; 90th Pa.; and 149th Pa.

We will be contracting for repairs to: 10th Mass., 11th Mass., and 4th New York (Smith's Battery) as well – two of which were severely damaged by vandalism in 2006.

Upcoming annual cyclic maintenance projects include:

- Design/Construction drawings to replace fire detection systems in 51 historic structures
- Replace electrical systems in barns
- Restore the Collis Memorial
- Cyclic monument preservation projects.
- Repaint seven structures at Eisenhower NHS
- Rehabilitate the National Cemetery comfort station
- Rehabilitate foundation walls on historic structures
- Remove asbestos siding and rehabilitate exterior on the the Cobean barn
- Replace boilers in historic structures
- Stabilize the John Blocher house
- Rehabilitate Cobean house outbuildings
- Rehabilitate Eisenhower NHS Farm 3 Barn

Rostrum - With funding from a donor to the Gettysburg Foundation, the park has the opportunity to restore the National Cemetery Rostrum in time for the Sesquicentennial. This structure, built in 1879, was one in a series of similar rostrums erected in Civil War-related national cemeteries that same year. The park is currently researching how to restore the numerous lost commemorative features to the rostrum, such as weeping vines and ivy on the trellises.






The Eisenhower home needs exterior preservation work, including repairs to the shutters, windows, and major repainting. We are now doing the shutters and windows. The exterior painting will be performed by contract this summer.

**Cyclorama Building** - We also plan to complete the public planning process for the future of the Cyclorama building and begin implementation of the chosen alternative.

# Blogs, Special Events Planned for CW150

To mark the 150th anniversary of the start of the American Civil War, Gettysburg National Military Park is launching new social media programs, including a blog for history and current events and a blog for teachers and students of the Civil War.



From the Fields of Gettysburg is a new weekly blog by park rangers and historians that will explore a wide variety of history topics and park news.

"From the Fields of Gettysburg will be a wonderful resource for people anywhere in the world who want to know more about what happened here, and why it's so important even today," said Scott Hartwig, a supervisory historian at the park. "We can blog year-round, in any weather, and our visitors don't even need to be in Gettysburg to participate."

In addition to Hartwig, numerous park historians and rangers will be contributing regularly, including Angie Atkinson, Matt Atkinson, Bert Barnett, Troy Harman, John Heiser, Tom Holbrook, Evangelina Rubalcava, and Karlton Smith. Katie Lawhon will write about park news and management issues.

The Gettysburg School Bus is a new monthly blog for educators that will serve as a bridge between the park ranger and the teacher, offering answers for classroom questions, new ideas for teaching units in the classroom, bulletin boards, paper and project ideas, and cross-curricular connections with other

teachers. Barbara Sanders, the park's education specialist, is the blogger.



Although the official 150th anniversary for the Battle of Gettysburg is July 1-3, 2013, Gettysburg's commemoration will run from 2011 to 2015. The NPS commemorates these defining events in our nation's history and their legacy in the continuing fight for civil rights. "Gettysburg events, activities and programs during the four years will honor the brave men and women whose courage and devotion to duty shaped our nation," said Bob Kirby, park superintendent. "We will include stories of both well-known and lesser-known events, soldiers and civilians, and an important goal of the commemoration is to reach new and younger audiences — Gettysburg for a New Generation."
