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Preface

The Harry S Truman National Historic Site was created in 1983 and since then has been managed by the National Park Service.¹ The Farm² Harrv S Truman was incorporated into the Harry S Truman National Historic Site in 1993 congressional bv authorization.³

Both the home in Independence and the Farm in Grandview. Missouri are intimately associated with the life of Harry S Truman, the 33rd President of the United States.

Harry S Truman moved into 219 North Delaware after his marriage to Bess Wallace and their subsequent honeymoon in the summer of 1919.⁴ When Harry S Truman went to Washington as a Senator from Missouri, the Senator and his wife Bess still called 219 North Delaware home. The intimate connection with this residence continued even after the 33rd President of the United

This farm was originally owned by Solomon and Harriet Young the maternal grandparents to Harry S Truman. It was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places in 1978 and upgraded to National Historic Landmark status in 1985 as the Harry S Truman Farm.

States was inaugurated into office. When Harry Truman became the President, 219 North Delaware came to be fondly known as the Summer White House.⁵ Whenever he and his familv came on visits to Independence from Washington, D.C they always spent their time at the home.

At the end of his Presidency, the Truman's came back to Missouri and resided at 219 North Delaware from 1953-1982⁶. During this period, the Truman's undertook to renovate their residence⁷. The renovation included some interior redecoration involving the replacement of a number of wallpaper coverings. It is known from written records that both Harry and Bess Truman were actively involved in choosing some of the wallpaper coverings that are observed today at the Truman Home in Independence, Missouri.⁸ The task of the installation of the wallpapers fell on Mr. Robert Nickell - the only interior wallpaper installer known to have worked for the Truman's at their Independence. Missouri home from 1953-1973⁹.

It was at the Grandview Farm Home that Harry S Truman spent eleven

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years of his adult life¹⁰ - a farm that he ultimately managed during three of those years.¹¹ His courtship of Bess Wallace, his future wife, began while he lived on the Truman Farm. It was from there that he left home in 1917 to join the military during World War I.

The date and the installer of the initial wallpaper coverings at the Farm Home are not known despite our best effort to find relevant The information. level of involvement, if any, of Harry S Truman in any decisions concerning the interior decoration of the Farm Home during his residency at the Farm is not known. What is known is that there were wallpaper coverings that decorated the interior of the Farm Home during Truman's residency at the farm.

Also known is that in 1984 new wallpaper coverings were installed in the interior of the Farm Home. Some samples of the original wallpapers that were presumably installed during the Truman years at the farm ca. 1906-1917 were retrieved¹². These sample wallpapers have given us important primary source data used in this research for the reconstruction of the history of wallpaper coverings at the Farm Home.

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Chapter One: Introduction

Documentation Objectives

This Wallpaper Documentation Report results from а contract between the National Park Service (NPS) — Midwest Archeological Center Lincoln, NE (MWAC) and Mustardseed Cultural and Environmental Services, LLC (MCE). Representatives from the NPS Independence, Missouri office identified the wallpapers within the historic sites that were to be evaluated and documented as part of this report.

As specified in the contract's scope of work. the purpose of this documentation is to assess the current conditions of the wallpapers at the Truman Home and the Farm Home: and to provide information about the wallpaper manufacturers and age. The documentation effort is also designed to provide enough detailed information that will help park service personnel to make informed planning decisions future on wallpaper replacement and/or reproduction.

Extent of Documentation

Principally, 29 wallpapered spaces in the Truman Home, 6 remnant rolls and 6 wallpapered spaces at the Farm Home were evaluated and documented in this report. Floor plans for both sites are in Appendix F.

Most of the wallpapers evaluated at the Truman Home appear to have

been installed during the1953-1973 "modernization" activities that took place at the home. The 6 remnant rolls of wallpapers that were appear to have examined been remnant rolls from the "modernization" projects at 219 N. Delaware.

The current wallpapers at the Farm Home were installed during a 1984 renovation effort. However, samples of wallpapers that were on the walls of the Farm Home before the renovation were examined in search of information on the wall and ceiling papers used in the Farm Home between ca. 1906-1917 - the period that Harry Truman lived and worked on the family farm.

Research and Survey Methodology

A tour of the home, farm home and Harry S Truman archives was undertaken to view the current and historical wallpapers; and to obtain relevant reports, books, manuscripts, resources and possible sources available from the NPS.

Some data also came from published and unpublished documents; NPS offices, and the Harry S. Truman Presidential Library and Museum. Other sources include: the Kansas City Public Library; the Mid-Continent Public Library; the Jackson County Historical Society Journals. the Ward Montgomery Catalogs The Cooper-Hewitt collection, Museum and the Sears General Catalogs collection.

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Initially digital photographs were taken on the fine¹³ setting at the home and of the wallpapers stored in the National Park Service storage facility. These photographs were used to compare with wallpapers from other sources includina "vintage" from internet wallpapers sites: wallpaper illustrations carried in department store catalogs: photographs and documents from the Harry S. Truman Presidential and Mid-continent Public Libraries; the Smithsonian Cooper-Hewitt Museum files and, finally to serve as a visual source for wallpaper companies via email.

Photographs that have any association to the Truman's Home and Farm Home were carefully studied. These include photographs from newspaper articles, magazine publications and family photographs. Most of these are housed in local libraries and archives, especially the photographic collections stored at the Harry S. Truman Library and Museum in Independence, Missouri.

As required by the NPS under this contract, photographic documentation is extensively used in this research to record vital information.

High quality 35mm digital camera and lenses were used to document sections of each existing wallpaper pattern, including full width and pattern repeat lengths of design in the Truman Home and at the Farm Home. The photographs are produced in both black-and-white and color. The 4x6 black-and-white prints are developed on Kodak Professional archival quality papers and are also provided on archival quality DVD.

Encapsulated wallpapers were scanned at a high resolution at the Linda Hall Library. Scanning was chosen because it allowed for safer handling of the remnant papers and fragments. Scans and photographs include a full width and pattern repeat lengths of each design. The scans and photographs have been stored on Kodak DVD with scale and location documentation within the images.

The photographic documentation is provided in a separate volume, Attachment 1, in addition, labeled index/contact sheets of the photographs is included in Appendix J.

Internet, patent, library, city directory and yellow page searches were conducted to locate the known manufacturer of any of the wallpaper with manufacturer information on the selvedge, and/or with company's name mentioned in the "Truman Receipts" or in the Nickell diary. Those manufacturers were contacted by telephone and email and asked to identify the wallpaper from the fine digital photographs. They were also asked to look at the wallpapers with no identification information. An attempt was also made to trace the wallpaper companies listed in the Truman papers.

Research information was also sourced from several avenues

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including Ron Cockrell's Historic Structures Report, documented oral interviews with Mr. Nickell who hung most of the existing wallpapers, magazine and newspaper articles, other relevant oral interview previous research¹⁴ transcripts, wallpaper resource archives, and Truman household receipts. Information from these sources was used postulate conclusions to regarding the probable manufacture and installation dates of the research wallpapers.

National archives were searched. Inhouse comparative analysis of the wallpapers was carried out at the Cooper-Hewitt, National Design Museum. Two direct matches - the Deerfield pattern which was in the Central Hall of the Truman Home and the current Birge wallpaper in the Living Room were made through the analysis. Additional in-house data search was also carried out at the Chicago History Museum Research Center.

Desk-top database search of wallpapers at the Historic New England repository was conducted through their searchable online catalog publications and (www.historicnewengland.org/wallpaper/). The repository has an extensive collection of wallpapers with national and international associations dating from the 1750's to 1950's. One direct match was found of the LincrustaWalton dado in the Central Hallway and Stairway of the Truman Home.

Oral histories including those compiled from contemporary local informants provided good source materials used in this report. Data from local and national newspaper and other media-type accounts were sourced for relevant information.

А number of wallcovering manufacturing and design companies were researched and contacted for relevant information. They include. Wallcoverings Blue Mountain of New York: Champlain, W.C. Manufacturing Co., LLC located in Pennsylvania, Hannah's Hanover. Report Format

This report is organized in chapters. Beginning with the introduction, the report provides a synthesis of the entire investigation in an executive summary. This is followed by a chapter that provides a background listing of the study wallpapers. Next is assessment of the an current conditions of the wallpapers at both the Truman Home and the Farm Home. The research findings including observations and recommendations form the final

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Executive Summary

conditions The current of the wallpapers at both the Truman Home and Farm Home range from "relatively good" to "fair." The staff of the National Park Service has done a good job through preservation efforts to maintain several of the wallpapers in their current good condition. The decision to document the wallpapers at this time is very timely. We are confident that the information contained in this report will provide the NPS with an enhanced resource that is needed to deal with the ever changing conditions of wallpapers that are oftentimes brought by the passage of time.

In this report, we provide information on the current condition of wallpapers in each room and other spaces where wallpaper covering is present within the Truman Home and the Farm Home. The most important information provided in this report, is the detailed description and photographic documentation of the currently hung and the curated wallpapers to allow reproducibility. We believe that these two sets of information are equally important and reinforce one another. Effectively used, the NPS will have the tool it needs for making assessments of the wallpapers' condition in the future, and an enhanced basis for accurate reproduction.

Professional photographs of the required wallpaper patterns in the Truman Home and Farm Home including a full width and pattern repeat lengths of the designs form a core documentation outcome of this project.

Photographs were made in black and white and in color with a high quality camera and lenses. One set of black and white prints (4x6) were produced Endura on Kodak and Roval Professional non-fiber digital papers archive life: 100 years in typical light display and 200 years in typical dark storage conditions¹⁵. Photographs are provided with scale and location documentation within the image with high resolution and lack of grain. The photographs and scans are also provided as .tiff images on a DVD.

Two archive quality DVD's of the scans, black and white and color photographs are provided with scale and room number documentation within the image as part of the project deliverable. Black and white and color labeled index sheets are included with this report on Kodak professional paper. The black/white prints, index sheets, and photographic DVDs are stored in Avery acid free, archival safe sleeves in Attachment 1 provided under a separate cover.

Written documentation is provided to the extent possible. The written documentation includes detailed information on each wallpaper investigated (each is assigned a Room number) and all other known information regarding manufacturer, manufacturer width, and interval of pattern repetition. An attempt has

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been made to provide the generational sequence the of wallpaper. First generation refers to the oldest layer; the fourth generation would be the more recent laver of paper. Note that the generational sequence provided in this study is based on the available samples; others may have existed that are not known.

A tracing of room 207 was not provided because there are several alternatives available that will provide high quality reproduction and require high quality digital images. Those include:

- Digital imaging and scans. Silkscreening requires digital cameraready artwork that is vector or a minimum of 300 dpi resolution. The professional digital images and scans taken at the Linda Hall Library greatly exceeded this resolution. The digital image as a vector file can be enlarged to the desired wallpaper width without distortion. A list of companies that will reproduce by screening as well as by block print is provided in this report, see Appendix B.
- Digital Flatbed- Vutek direct to substrate. With quality digital photographs, custom full size wallpaper can be produced on the desired media for approximately \$11/square foot.

Remnant rolls were examined, identified and documented to the extent possible, written and photographic documentation is included in this report. All but one of the rolls were too brittle to safely handle, therefore, a high quality representative sample of catalog number [3103/3104], Attic Vestibule, was taken with a full width and repeat length of design and was encapsulated in polyester with an identification label enclosed.

Underlying papers stored in the NPS archives were examined, photographed and dated to the extent possible.

Research of the photographic collections at the Harry S. Truman Library and Museum was conducted to reference and identify all earlier, non-extant wallpapers in the home. A description of the wallpaper by design, style, and by photograph number, date taken, and location of photograph has been created as part of this report, a summary is in Appendix E.

A search for Robert Nickell's business papers included a limited genealogy search to locate possible heirs that may have records. Local colleges and universities, historical societies and archives were contacted to determine if Mr. Nickell's business records had been donated by his family; none have been found. A list of contacted sources is in Appendix C.

The Lincrusta-Walton dado was photographed, documented, and identification of manufacturer was completed. The Aesthetic design was manufactured by Frederick Beck and

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Company between 1885-1890¹⁶. This wallcovering was manufactured in Stamford, Connecticut; however the current manufacturer of Lincrusta is in England. An agreement with U.S. distributor was made at the end of 2006: contact information is in Appendix D. Based on the digital information provided to the current manufacturer, a very rough cost estimate would be £18k (\$36) per design. This would be dependent on the complexity of each design and also how many designs there are in total. Other cost factors include any hand work required along with the circumference and repeat of each design.

Detailed measurements of papered surfaces were made by room at the Truman Home. An estimate of the total paper surface for each Room, using Attachment C format provided by the NPS in the RFP was used to record the information and is provided in this report in Appendix A.

Alternative strategies recommended in the report, should not be read to be exhaustive, rather they are designed to provide the current state-of-the-art methods. Where cost estimates are provided, those costs reflect today's market rates and are susceptible to change.

Wallpaper coverings in both the home and the Farm Home will need continued attention. With the aging of the structures, preserving the integrity of the wallpapers will continue to be increasingly complex.

We are gratified to note that at this present time, the NPS has taken considerable steps to address some of the causal factors (e.g. structural problems) that have had a negative impact on the condition of the wallpaper coverings. We believe that this documentation report provides the NPS with an effective tool for use in its preservation efforts.

Worth noting are a number of factors that could potentially impact any continued effort to better preserve the current condition, quality and longevity of the wallpaper. One of these factors consists the of continued cracking, sagging or spalling of the plaster walls and ceilings. In the areas where this damage is occurring, there is visible damage to the wallpapers. It is recommended that consistent and sustained preventative maintenance measures be put in place that will help monitor the effects of these structural changes on the wallpapers.

The nature of the materials used in the production of wallpapers generally presents some unique challenges relative to preservation. Most of the paper materials become brittle over time under uncontrolled temperatures. Currently, the NPS does a good job with temperature controls at the Truman Home, at the farm and at the cave, where the wallpaper remnants are stored. We recommend that such temperature control monitoring continue.

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Cautionary Tale

Historically manufacturers in the 1950's changed their entire line every two years. According to a wallpaper consultant¹⁷ that examined the wallpapers in-situ at the Truman Home, all of the wallpapers are likely a cotton rag base. The wallpapers have either been surface printed or produced by a gravure process. Most of the wallpapers were probably made in the United States. The papers were probably purchased locally; however, tracing local purchases was not successful, because available records did not provide enough detail.

In trying to get information on the nature of the fiber and pigmentation of the wallpapers, we found out that trying to get such information would be cost prohibitive, would lead to the destruction of the papers for purposes of analysis, and more over that such information is not necessarily needed for reproduction purposes.

The death of key individuals with direct knowledge about most of the wallpaper procurement and installation work at the Truman Homes was a profound binding constraint that faced this research effort. We ameliorated the impact of this constraint on our overall data gathering process by sound usage of good secondary source materials.

Although it is not possible to guarantee that this historic wallpapers study has identified all possible information regarding the wallpaper coverings, the information presented in this report represents what is known and gathered through acceptable research methodologies.

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Chapter Two: Background Information on Existing Wallpaper

This chapter presents a background normative listina of wallpaper coverings that have been part of the interior finishing at the Truman Farm Home and at the Truman Home respectively. The listing concentrates on the time period between ca. 1906-1917 and ca. 1919-1982. These dates are directly associative with the period of time when Harry S Truman lived at the Farm Home in Grandview, Missouri; and, the period when both Harry S Truman and Bess Truman resided Truman Home at in Independence, Missouri. Much of the information is generated from photographs taken at different times. Additional information was gathered from currently hung wallpapers at the Independence home and from remnant papers at the Farm Home, and from other sources. All of the The wallpapers sources are cited. are discussed in terms of their locations and relative dates of installation.

Wallpaper Coverings at Truman Home- 219 N. Delaware, Independence, Missouri

The earliest evidence of wallpaper covering we found is from a 1905 photograph¹⁸. The photograph was taken in the area of the Music Room/Parlor [Room 108]. The exact date in 1905 that the photograph was

taken is not known. The wallpaper design in the photograph depicts light spade shaped objects in a repeating pattern on a dark background. The photograph is a black and white photograph and may explain the dark background seen on the photograph.

A 1938 photograph¹⁹ taken of the Foyer [Room 102], Central Hall [103-A] and the Stairway [107] areas provides information on the wallpaper covering that was part of the interior finishes of the Truman Home during this period. The design on the wallpaper depicts three scenes that repeat every other one. One scene is a boy on a bridge, one is a grouping of tree/shrubs and the third is a corner of a building surrounded by trees. The designs are cast on a light background and show the Lincrusta dado.

The Dining Room [Room 110] was the scene of a 1940 photograph²⁰ that depicts wallpaper covering on what appears to be the east wall of the room. The wallpaper design shows a repeating pattern of a pastoral scene of a woman surrounded by trees and shrubs. A 1944 photograph in an issue of <u>Life</u> indicates that the color of the wallpaper was maroon.²¹ This wallpaper was changed in 1960.²²

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Five photographs of the Living Room [Room 104] taken in 1934, 1943, 1949²³ 1948 and 1945. show evidence of wallpaper coverings. Our research shows that the 1945, 1948 and 1949 wallpaper design is the same wallpaper covering currently in the Living Room area. This is the oldest wallpaper still hanging on the walls of the Summer White House. The pattern consists of alternating vertical stripes of satin peach and white cream with a smaller vertical beige stripe along the left edge overlaid by a large off-white bouquet of flowers. The fact that the wallpaper in this room was left as it was since 1945 is authenticated by the following remarks from Ron Cockrell,

"Nickell was indeed given the job to redecorate the home's interior in stages over the next twenty years, from 1953 to 1973. He worked in every room on the first floor except the living room and all but the bathroom on the second."²⁴

and supported by work receipts kept by Mr. Robert Nickell himself.²⁵

By early 1950 there is evidence from a photograph taken of the Dining Room [Room 110] indicating that the wallpaper covering in that room was

The 1950 photograph²⁶ replaced. depicts a mottled random pattern design illustrated on light background rather than the repeating pattern of a scene of pastoral а woman surrounded by trees and shrubs that was depicted in the 1940 wallpaper covering. Although one is unable to discern adequately the pattern details of this wallpaper, it is clear that it was not the same wallpaper covering that was depicted in the 1940 photograph.

Our investigation of the history of wallpaper installation at the Truman Home finds that from the end of 1952 through 1973 there were multiple wallpaper installation jobs carried out during this period. All but one of the installations was done by Mr. Robert Nickell.²⁷

During (1952 - 1973),this period Robert Nickell worked to change the wallpapers in the storage room [Room 213], kitchen [Room 113], pantry [Room 112], first floor bedroom [Room 105]. Margaret Truman's second floor bedroom [Room 204], Harry S Truman's bedroom [Room 205], the first floor parlor/music room [Room 108], and Margaret Truman childhood bedroom [Room 210].

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From work records kept by Robert Nickell it is known that the wallpaper in the storage room [Room 213] (a room that was once used by Madge Wallace as a sitting room) above the kitchen was replaced in January 1953. This was the first wallpaper removal and installation work that Mr. Robert Nickell performed for the Truman family.^{28,29} These 1953 wallpaper jobs were followed-up in 1954 with the repapering of the walls of the kitchen and the pantry. The kitchen walls were repapered three times (1954, 1963 and 1971)³⁰

The first floor bedroom [Room 105] (known as the Gates bedroom) was wall papered in 1954 as part of an effort to transform it into a guest room³¹. The wallpaper³² that covered the second floor northwest corner

bedroom [Room 204] used by Margaret Truman was replaced in 1954. Also wallpapered in 1954 was the Truman bedroom [Room 205].

It is not clear when the current wallpaper in the music/parlor room was installed. The best estimate is that it was installed after 1956.33 What is known from our research is that the music/parlor room has had at least four different wallpaper coverings since 1905. As seen in a the 1905 photograph, wallpaper covering had a design that depicts light spade shaped objects in a repeating pattern on а dark background. This wallpaper was later replaced with two different vertical striped design wallpapers in unknown order. The current wallpaper in the music/parlor area is a metallic gold and white foliated scrolls with leaves and curled tendrils with delicate sprays of gold and white pollen on a areen-gold metallic moiré background.

Wallpaper Coverings at Truman Farm Home-12301 Blue Ridge Blvd Grandview, Missouri

The primary evidence for early wallpaper coverings at the Farm Home during the interpretative period ca. 1906-1917 is taken primarily from conserved wallpaper remnants that were retrieved from five areas of the home including the hall, parlor and

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three upstairs bedrooms. Secondary sources of information for this normative listing include several period photographs taken between 1906-1917 of the Truman at the Farm Home and information from oral history accounts.

The installation date of the Farm hall wallpaper, is not empirically established, however it appears to be the second layer according to a conservator hired in 1983 to provide documentation some on the wallpaper. Neither the pattern number or name, or patent number is known. paper The was probably manufactured between 1900 and 1927^{34} . The post-impressionist pattern of white, grey and blue flowers with a muted gravish blue background is highly associated with the work of the Robert Griffin Company - a well known wallpaper covering manufacturer in the early 20th century. The exact location and manufacture date for this wallpaper is not known.

The Farm Lower [101] and Upper [201] Hall wallpaper (HSTR 30513/30520), installation date is not known, and it appears to be a third generation installation, after 1917. The pattern number and name; patent number and pattern date range is not known. Pattern is a free flowing floral of dark red flowers on dark green stems with brown outlines on a deep tan background in the Romanesque style. Pattern manufacturer, dates of manufacture and location of manufacture is not known.

The Farm Parlor [102] wallpaper (HSTR 30515/30518), appears to be the oldest layer according to the conservator hired in 1983. The installation date is not known. The pattern date range is circa 1905-1910³⁵. Therefore it can be postulated that it may have been installed within our investigative timeframe. The pattern is an Arts and Crafts style of shaped and segmented vertical rows with diagonally alternating elements composed of deep green and deep red rose geometric and curvilinear elements. No manufacture date or of manufacture location is established.

The Farm second floor southwest [203] Bedroom (Mary Jane's Bedroom) wallpaper, (HSTR 30511/30514/30517) installation date is not known, however it appears to be the second-generation laver according to the conservator hired in 1983. The pattern date range is circa 1900-1915. The pattern is bouquets of white lilies, narcissus and other flowers set in a diagonal design loosely enframed with green fern fronds with tendrils on a deep beige background. The manufacturer was Carey Brothers Company possibly produced between1890-1910.³⁶ The location of manufacture is not known.

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The Farm second floor northwest Bedroom [202] wallpaper (HSTR 30512/30519), appears to be the laver according the oldest to conservator hired in 1983. The installation date, patent number, pattern number and name are not known. The pattern date range is circa 1902-1913. The pattern is a diagonally alternating design of olive green outlined in deep burgundy with large palmate motifs, encircled with dots with a fleur-de-lis with a frieze element. The manufacturer is the Potter Wall Paper Mills that was located in New York and Chicago.

The Farm East Bedroom [204] wallpaper (HSTR 30516), installation date is not known. The pattern number and name, and, patent number and pattern date range is not known. The wallpaper design is an aesthetic free-flowing floral design with cream and light yellow flowers with dark red highlights connected by light ochre and white foliage which is bordered in dark green on a beige background with a frieze element. Manufacturer date and location are not known.

According to an oral history interview with Betty Dawson, the current wallpapers at the Farm Home were chosen based on the recollections of childhood friends of President Truman.³⁷

Textured checkered wallpaper pattern with deep aqua-blue, light aqua-green, cream and cocoa brown squares with horizontal and vertical beige streaks and bronze flecks on a light cocoa-brown background.

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Chapter Three: Current Wallpaper Condition Assessment

The assessment of the current condition of the wallpapers at the Truman Home and the Farm Home was carried out in four separate inspections. The inspections were conducted at the Truman Home on August 11, 2006, November 13, 2006 and December 21, 2006; and on December 6, 2006 at the Farm Home. Floor plans for both sites are located in Appendix F.

Stored remnant rolls were also examined to assess their condition and integrity.

The inspections concentrated on gathering information about types of defects/damages (if any) that could be observed on each of the Inspections wallpapers. also concentrated on the determination of the proximate and immediate causes of the defects/damages. Field from observations taken the inspections are documented in the preceding narrative that describes the current condition of each of the wallpapered Rooms. Information gathered from the field inspections is also recorded in the "Wallpaper Analysis Sheet" that is included in Appendix A of this report.

Photographic documentation was made of the observed defects/damages in order to have a visual sense of the overall nature, location and extent of the defects/damages that were observed. The photographs are presented as a composite part of the narrative.

There are four different types of damages that have impacted the integrity of the wallpapers. Several of the damages were water stain related damages. Another source of damage to the wallpapers appears to be due to wall spalling, cracking of plaster walls and ceilings, sagging and bulging. In the areas where these have occurred, the wallpapers have sustained minor to major peelings and/or tears. Another form of damage observed was color fading of some of the wallpapers. These appear to have been caused by extensive exposure to sunlight. There are areas where the wallpapers show signs of puckering primarily occurring along the wall corners.

Most of the damages and defects appear on wallpapers at the Truman Home. Only two wallpaper damages were observed at the Farm Home. This is understandable given that the wallpapers at the Farm Home were installed in 1984 while the wallpapers at the Truman Home are papers that were installed between circa 1885 and 1973.

Truman Home Wallpaper Conditions

First Floor

Water stain damages were observed on the wallpapers in the Living Room [Room 104]. There are observable water stains above the window and

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some bubbling along the east and west corner junctions of the Music Room [Room108].

The most pronounced water stain damage is observed in the Pantry.

Here the damage appears in the ceiling areas. The stain has led to the discoloration of the wallpaper in the pantry ceiling.

The structural cracking and the peeling of the wall plaster in the Dining Room [Room 110] and also in the Music Room [Room 108] have caused the wallpapers in these rooms to sustain observable tear damages.

The Lincrusta-Walton (Lincrusta) wall coverings in the Central Hallway [Room 103] and along the lower portions of the Stairway [Room 103-A] are faded due probably to exposure to excessive sunlight. It also shows sign of cracks on the lower portion. Also the Lincrusta covering at the stairway is cracked at the inside corners at both landings.

There is an area of small missing wallpaper adjacent to the south wall of the Study [Room 109]. There is also some minor fading of the wallpaper color in an area where a picture has been removed from the wall. We were not able to examine areas behind the book cases and shelves. Apart from the observed minor damages, the wallpaper condition in this room is relatively good.

Second Floor

The wallpaper in the Master Bedroom [Room 204] on the second floor of the home has water stain damages. The water stains are above the ceiling area and on portions of the east wall of the room. The stains can be seen as water streaks that run from the top of the wallpaper across the midportions of the paper. The original colors on the paper designs have faded due in part to the water stains.

There is a large bulge in the plaster on the east wall of the Guest Bedroom [Room 207] and the stress crack on the wall plaster have caused the wallpaper coverings to sustain tear damages in several places. There are also visible water stain damages to the wallpaper covering behind the entrance door.



Ex. 7 Master Bedroom [Room 204] The ceiling is showing water stain-damage. The damage appears to have abated due to structural repairs to the leaking roof area.

the top of wallpaper across the mid-portions of the wallpaper covering.

In the Truman Dressing Room [Room 209] there are both water stain damages and a fading of the colors of the wallpaper. The water stains occur above the west window jamb and above the south wall ceiling. The fading occurs on the south wall and there is some creasing of the wallpaper at the corner junctions of the east and west wall.

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The Storage Room [Room 213] has water stains, fading and creasing damage to the wallpaper coverings. The water stains occur at the western and eastern sides of the window sill and at the central and eastern windows respectively. There are also water stains at the center of the chimney and above the baseboard in the center of the passage wall and on the ceiling board. The wallpaper is faded along the north and south walls There is an area of of the room. loose, stained and creased wallpaper at the center of the chimney.

The Attic Vestibule

The wallpaper coverings along the stairway leading to the attic vestibule area and on the ceiling within the same area are the worst damaged among the entire group of wallpaper coverings that were observed during this documentation effort. The physical and design integrity of the wallpaper coverings are badly There are serious compromised. water stains that have affected the original coloration of the designs of the papers and have damaged the paper material itself.

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Truman Farm Home Current Wallpaper Conditions

The current condition of most of the wallpapers at the Farm Home appears to be in better shape than those observed at the Truman Home. All of the current wallpapers at the Farm Home were installed in 1984.

Wallpapered rooms that were examined at the Farm Home are those that were installed in the following areas in the first floor: the Hall area [Room 101], the upper Stairway and Hall [Room 101B], the Parlor [Room 102], and the Sitting Room [Room 103]. Wallpapered rooms on the second floor of Farm Home were also examined. The spaces include those in the Foyer area [Room 201], Mamma Truman Bedroom [Room 202], Mary Jane Truman's Bedroom [Room 203] and Harry Truman's Bedroom [Room 204].

The aging of the Home has had some impact on the condition of the wallpaper coverings since they were installed in the 1980's. Wall plaster cracking has caused tear damage on some of the wallpaper coverings. The one location where this is evident is in the Mary Jane Truman's Room [Room 203]. The damage is along the corner junction of the south and east walls of the room.

Other than this room, we did not observe any other wallpaper damages at the Farm Home. There were no water stain damages nor peeling or creasing of wallpaper coverings as is relatively commonly observed at the Truman Home. It is important to note that this does not imply that more attention is being paid to the Farm Home.

Farm Home Wallpaper Remnants Condition

The remnant rolls of wallpapers stored by the NPS at the caves were examined to determine the possibility of encapsulation. The rolls that are already encapsulated were in excellent condition. Most of the samples that were encapsulated were too brittle to be removed from their current enclosures.

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Chapter Four: Research Findings

Truman Home



Ex. 16 Central Hall, Foyer, Stairway, Alcove [Rooms 102/103/201/202/208].

The current traditional classic wallpaper in the Foyer [Room 102], Central Hall [Rooms: 103/202/208]. Stairway [Rooms: 103-A/202-B] and Alcove [Room 201] a designer style wallpaper of gold metallic floral brocade and filigree pattern on a light gold background. The texture is meant to imitate silk. It was manufactured by Imperial; the date of manufacture is not known. Based on consultation with Hirshfield's Commercial wallcoverings, the papers are likely cotton rag and either surface printed or gravure process; most papers in the home are of this The current wallpaper is the tvpe. third generation of wallcoverings. All of these wallpaper locations were installed on March 29. 1973. according to the Robert Nickell diary. The wallpapers are in good to fair condition and the pattern number is 2J071 run 4. There is a sample in the

collection. This is the third generation of wallcovering; historic photographs indicate that the second generation was the Deerfield Pattern and the first was three pastoral scenes on a light background. See this wallpaper data on pages 27-28.

embossed relief wallcovering An dado, Lincrusta- Walton, is found in the Foyer, Central Hall and Stairway. This dado consists of a top-heavy chair rail with large knob heads and alternating with horn flowers. The top trim is a horizontal filigree pattern; beneath it are alternating rectangular areas with butterflies and flowers, and birds and flowers. The midsection consists of alternating squares: a bird blackberry bushes perched on above a water scene with lily pads and a sunburst background (the principle element), and three vertical rectangles with an abstract twinning pattern and flowers. Beneath each square is an alternating horizontal rectangle with three single flowers and shamrocks. The bottom trim is a

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single repeating flower. The Historic New England Magazine Winter/Spring 2005 volume page 10 shows this exact design in the dining room of the Roseland Cottage in Connecticut. The principle element design was patented in 1884 by Albert Leisel and manufactured from 1885 to 1890. His description of the pattern is, "bird is standing on a branch of a nut-tree with a spray of leaves and filberts." The dado was probably installed with the original décor of the home in the late 1880's. It is evident in pictures taken at the home in 1938, and is in fair condition. For this wallpaper data see pages 29-31.



Ex. 18 Living Room [Room 104]

The Living Room [104] wallpaper, a Victorian floral and stripe style paper, has a large floral spray of roses on a wide light and dark stripe background with an alternating small leaf like garland stripe on the wall and an abstract single line of flowers and leaves on the ceiling. It was installed in 1946 and is in fair condition with some cracks and fading. The Birge Company manufactured the wallcovering in the 1940's; the wallpaper's pattern number is 5373 run 8. A reproduction sample made in the 1940's is at the Cooper-Hewitt Museum. A photograph if this sample should be taken to use for reproduction purposes. It is probably cotton rag and produced by either surface print or gravure process. See pages 32-33.



Ex. 19 Gates Bedroom and Bathroom [Room 105 and 106]


The Gates Bedroom [105] and Bathroom [106] wallpaper has a classic floral style pattern of pink, yellow and blue with green foliage. This cotton rag wallpaper was installed in 1954. It is in poor condition with major cracks, wear and discoloration of large areas. lts pattern number is Lancastria Line run 3 made in England. The manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. See pages 34-35 for this wallpaper data.

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Ex. 20 Music Room [Room 108]

The wallpaper in the Music Room [108] has an aesthetic scattered shiny swirl frond design on pale green background, a designer style paper. The cotton rag wallpaper is in fairpoor condition with water stains, cracks and puckering. Its pattern number is 1103E run 2. Robert Nickell installed it sometime after 1957. The manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. This is the fourth generation of wallcovering in this room, historic photographs (1953-1957) show a generation pattern of alternating light and dark stripes of varying widths and an un-dated remnant sample indicates а generation of light and dark stripes of the same width. Determination of which is the second and which is the third generation is not clear. The first generation (circa 1905) pattern consists of light spade shaped objects in a repeating pattern on a dark background. See pages 36-37 for current wallpaper data.



Ex. 21 Study [Room 109]

The Study [109] wallpaper has horizontal green, gray, and white dashes crossed by vertical green and gray dashes in a modern masculine checkered tweed type pattern. It was installed in 1956. This York Wall light tested, waterfast wallpaper is in very good condition. The wallpaper pattern name is Bedford run 3. The date of manufacture is not known. For this wallpaper data refer to pages 38-39.



Ex. 22 Dining Room [Room 110]

The wallpaper in the Dining Room [110], is a classic scalloped style paper, has embossed white

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medallions. white diamonds and scrolls with gold trim on a pale grav background. It was installed in 1960 and is in fair condition. The wallpaper's pattern number is 10212 run 1; the manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. It is the third generation; historic photographs indicate that the second generation was a mottled, random pattern on a background and the light first generation pattern consisted of a repeating pastoral scene of a woman surrounded by trees or shrubs. The current wallpaper data is on pages 40-41.



Ex. 23 Kitchen [Rooms 111/112/113]

The wallpaper in the Butler's Pantry [111], Pantry [112] and Kitchen [113] is a country art and craft style paper consisting of a small circular red and blue floral pattern, outlined in camelbrown on a cream background. This wallpaper was installed in 1971. Harry Truman selected this wallpaper. The condition of it is good to fair- with some cracks, wear and water spots. lt is Imperial Washable an Wallcovering, pattern number IAI461, run 2. The date of manufacture is not known. This is the fourth generation of wallpaper. The prior generations of wallcoverings are documented in the "Extant Truman Home Wallpaper" section of this report, this wallpaper data is on pages 42-43.



Ex. 24 Master Bedroom [Room 204] The Master Bedroom [204] is a formal English floral style paper with dainty bell-shaped flowers of pink and white with green on a blue background. The wallpaper is washable, and was manufactured Imperial bv Wallcoverings. The date of manufacture is not known. This second generation of wallcovering was installed in 1954 by Robert Nickell. It is in fair condition with some water damage, cracking and fading. The patent number 1950279 on the ceiling wallpaper selvedge was obtained March 6, 1934 by Alfred E. Van Wirt, Glens Falls, N.Y., assignor Imperial and Color Paper to Corporation, a corporation of New York. The patent is for a process of producing a water repellent coating on paper or similar material. See pages 44-46 for this wallpaper data.

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Ex. 25 Truman Bedroom [Room 205]

The oriental style wallpaper in the Truman Bedroom [205] and Sleeping Porch Passage [206-A] has a light blue, white, greenish yellow floral design with green stems on a blue background on linen textured paper. It is a Chinoiserie style and is printed to resemble silk. This second deneration of wallcovering was installed in 1954 and is in good The wallpaper's pattern condition. is IT322 number run 9: the manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. See pages 47-48.



Ex. 26 Guest Bedroom [Room 207]

The Guest Bedroom [207] wallpaper, a country style floral paper, has a large floral bouquet of red and white flowers that look like peonies. The manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. It was installed prior to 1953 and is in poor condition with cracking and water damage. See pages 49-50 for this wallpaper data.



Ex. 27 Truman Dressing Room [Room 209]

The wallpaper in the Truman Dressing Room [209], a modernistic masculine style paper, has randomly placed squares with a textured pattern in deep aqua-blue, light aquagreen, cream and cocoa brown, overprinted with horizontal and vertical beige streaks and bronze-gold flecks on a light cocoa-brown background. This wallpaper is in poor condition, with major water stains, cracks and some fading. The manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. See pages 51-52.

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Ex. 28 MMT Childhood Bedroom [Room 210]

The wallpaper in Margaret Truman's Childhood Bedroom [210] a classic romantic floral style paper, has a vibrant purple lilac bouquet encircled with blue flowers on a white horizontal ribbed textured paper. This second generation wallcovering was installed in 1960 and is in good condition. The manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. See pages 53-54 for this wallpaper data.



Ex. 29 Second Floor Bathroom [Room 211]

The second floor Bathroom [211] has a blue nouveau style geometric design of soft diamonds on a white background with gold flecks. This is probably the second generation of wallpaper and is in fair condition. Imperial was the manufacturer, the date of manufacture is not known. It was most likely installed in 1954³⁸. Discussion on the first generation wallcovering is found in the extant section of this report. See pages 55-56 for this paper details.

The Storage Room [213] wallpaper has yellow and white daisies with small white polka dots on a gray background. It is an arts and craft style paper. Installed in 1953 the

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wallcovering is in fair condition. This Imperial washable wallcovering pattern number is 2184 run 5. The patent number 1950279 refers to a producing a process of water repellent coating on paper or similar material granted on March 6, 1934. Patent information is found in Appendix G. The manufacturer and date of manufacture is not known. Note that Hannah's Treasures has a roll of the Border pattern of this wallpaper; contact information is in Appendix D. See pages 57-58 for this wallpaper data.



Ex. 32 Attic Vestibule [Room 304]

The Attic Vestibule [304] abstract wallpaper is hung both horizontally and vertically. It has fluffy popcorn like random designs on a light beige background. This Eisenhart wallpaper is in poor condition with severe water damage and its pattern number is 14 run 22. The date of installation and date manufacture is estimated to be between 1945 and 1955 and there is no sample in the collection. A chemist for Eisenhart provided information regarding this

paper³⁹. The wallcovering was made in their Hanover, Pennsylvania plant using a Surface Print process. This process gave a hand painted look and The background color was feel. applied via a rotating cylinder with brushes protruding out of it or by air knife-depending on the exact date of manufacture. The chemist did not know the exact date of manufacture. Following coating the paper was dried on a steam heated drying rack with the paper draped over 35 inch wide wooden dowel rods separated about every six inches for approximately 120 feet. Once dried the paper was fed through a Waldren Printing Press, the newest of which was built about 1895, they have older ones. These presses are still functional today. The inks were all made in-house, mostly consisting of casein, which was standard. The paper then received an alum wash or coating that insolubilized the casein. This technology offered high adhesion strength, but little flexibility. 



Its products were sold throughout the U.S., Europe, South America, South Africa and Australia. Brewster Wallcovering currently owns the Birge wallpaper line.


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

Truman Farm Home

Prior to the NPS acquisition of the Grandview farm, the staff of the Truman Farm Home Foundation went to great lengths to preserve evidence of the home's original furnishings and decoration. In 1984, John Huffman the architect hired by the Foundation recommended the wallpaper sections believed to be original to the home should be removed from the walls prior to the Huffman renovation work. Mr. recommended that the Foundation acquire reproduction wallpaper or locate wallpapers that closely matched the original papers. Huffman secured the services of Nancy Heugh of Heugh-Edmondson Conservation Services in Kansas City, Missouri to remove the wallpaper fragments believed to be original to the home, to document locations from which the fragments were removed and to encapsulate the samples for use in acquiring historically accurate wallpapers for the home. Ms. Heugh carefully removed the samples and performed documentation the and encapsulation process to ensure the samples were preserved.

Unfortunately, due to time restraints and the concern that the Farm Home be opened according to deadlines, the original plan of finding papers to match the originals was abandoned. The Farm Foundation pushed for the opening and selected papers to be used in the rooms that were not a close match stylistically to the original wallpaper. John Huffman was very unhappy with the decision to abandon historic accuracy and just get paper on the wall to meet the deadlines. There are letters in his papers that discuss his feelings on the subject.

The papers were "put away" and unfortunately when this was done no or documentation record was completed to show where the samples were placed. NPS received the Farm home and property in a transfer from Jackson County, Missouri in 1994. NPS personnel were told by Jackson County staff and Nancy Heugh that there were samples of the original wallpaper somewhere, but no one knew where, The samples could not be located.

In 1999, the box of wallpaper samples labeled, "Harry Truman Farm Home Old Wallpaper" was found at the estate sale of Ruby Jane Hall, a friend of the Truman family and member of the Farm Home Foundation. Ms. Hall had apparently stored the papers in her garage attic for "safekeeping." NPS staff was called by Betty Dawson about this find and Carol Dage and Karen Tinnin traveled to Grandview determine if these were the to missing sections. The samples were the originals and the family of Ms. Hall agreed to donate the paper to the park. (See HSTR Accession # 107.) [The preceding is a summarization.142

Appendix F: Truman Home and Truman Farm Home Floor Plans



The drawing represents a front plan view of 10 the design.

This design consists of four panels, which may be used singly or in combination for various kinds of decoration. Panel No. 1 consists of a bird standing on a branch of a nut-

- 15 tree with a spray of leaves and filberts. The lower part of the design shows water, on the surface of which float water-lilies and leaves, also long grass. On the horizon is seen a setting sun with radiating beams of light. Across
- 20 the landscape a butterfly wings its ilight. The groundwork of the design is filled in with a finely-granulated surface. Panel No. 2 consists of a wooded branch of a wild-rose tree, displaying an open bloom and a profusion of

leaves. The ground of the design is tilled in 25 with a beaded surface. Panels Nos, 3 and 4 are similar to the preceding, with, however, the important distinction that in the first instance the direction of the designs is from left to right, whereas in the second series the pedirection is from right to left. Each of the squares is surrounded by a border.



The design herein described and shown, consisting of the combination of four squares, two 35 of them occupying diagonal corners, consisting of the representation of a bird, a surface of water, a setting sun, a butterfly, leaves, and branches, and two squares in the other diagonal corners, consisting of the representation of spthe branch of a wild-rose tree displaying an open bloom and leaves, all of said squares being surrounded by a border.



According to my process a sizing material, such as casein, animal glue or albumen, is incorpolo rated in the material with which the web of paper or similar material is coated, and, after the application of such coating material to the web, preferably after the coating has been dried, an agent, such as formaldehyde or metallic salts,

agent, such as formaldehyde or metallic salts, for a mixture of such metallic salts, capable of converting the sizing material into a form substantially insoluble in water is applied to the coating.

If a figure or the like is to be printed upon 20 the coated web, sizing material of the character just referred to is added to the pigment with which such figure or the like is to be produced and the printing is effected on the coated web, preferably after the coating has dried and be-

After the application of the converting material to the coated or coated and printed web, the web is subjected to heat. They found in practice that by the applica-

I have found in practice that by the applica-30 tion of the sizing material and the converting material to the web in two steps, a relatively hard film possessing great water repelling qualities is produced upon the surface of the web; and I have found further that the best results 35 can be obtained and that the process can be

35 can be obtained and that the process can be carried out most expeditiously and economically by spraying the converting agent upon the surface of the coated web, since this makes it possible to apply the coating material to the web, to o print a four or pattern thereon, and to apply

40 print a figure or pattern thereon, and to apply the converting agent as a continuous process. In practicing my process, the web, such as paper, is first coated on one side with a composition preferably comprising clay and a solubi-

sition preferably comprising clay and a solubilized casein. If a colored or tinted coating is desired, a suitable pigment may be added to the coating material.

The coating is then dried. The desired figures or designs are then printed on the dried 50 coating with a composition comprising the solubilized casein, pigments, clay and the like. After the printing and before the drying of the printing, an agent capable of converting the casein into a form substantially insoluble in water, such

55 as a formaldehyde solution, is sprayed on the

coating and printing, and thereafter the coating and printing are dried. The converting agent reacts with the casein in the coating and printing, during the second or final drying, to convert the casein into a relatively hard, water-resistant film.

The manner in which the process is practiced is illustrated in the accompanying drawings, wherein:

Figure 1 is a diagrammatic view of an apparatus suitable for use in carrying out the process; Figure 2 is a sectional view taken on the vertical plane indicated by the line 2-2 of Figure 1, and Figure 3 is an enlarged view of printing and

Figure 3 is an enlarged view of printing and spraying elements of the apparatus. The apparatus shown comprises one or more

The apparatus shown comprises one or more coating or grounding machines, only one of which is shown and designated 1, lower drying racks 2 and 2^{a} , upper drying racks 3 and 3^{a} , and one or more printing machines, only one of the latter **78** machines being shown and designated 4. Ducts 5, which receive hot air from a flue 6, distribute the air throughout the drying racks 2, 2^{a} , 3 and 3^{a} . The air, which is warmed in a chamber 7 by a heater 8, is delivered to the flue 6 by a blower 9. **80** The apparatus as thus far described is of well known construction, and is adapted to simultaneously coat, print and dry one or more webs 10.

Each of the webs 10 is passed from a roll 11 to and through one of the coating or grounding mabias of the web sile of the coating or grounding machines 1, which completely covers one side of the web with a coating comprising clay and a sizing matter, if a colored coating is desired. This coating is dried by festooning the web on one of the drying racks 2 or 2^a. After the coating has dried, the web is passed between that drying rack 2 or 2^a, on which a portion of it is festooned, and the companion upper rack 3 or 3^a, to and through one of the machines 4, which prints the desired **95** figures or design on the dry coated surface with a composition comprising a sizing material, such as solubilized casein, pigments, clay and the like. The printed web is then passed over an endless beit 12, and, while moving over the belt, is sprayed, through the medium of nozzles 13, with a solution capable of converting the sizing material into a form substantially insoluble in water, such as a formaldehyde solution. The web is then festooned on a second drying rack 2 or 2^a. The web then passes to and is wound on a roller 14. Beater rolls 15 and 16, over which the web passes, aid in festooning the web on the drying racks. I prefer to use as a sizing material a solution of 110

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casein made by stirring 20 lbs, of dry casein into casent made by stirring 20 los. of dry casent into about 80 lbs. of water heated to about 50° C., to which is added, during the stirring, 4 lbs. of borax dissolved in sufficient water to form a concen-trated solution. This mixture is maintained at approximately the temperature just mentioned and the stirring is continued until the casein is dissolved and the mixture is free from human

- dissolved and the mixture is free from lumps. The amount of the borax may be slightly reduced
- or substantially increased to make slight changes 10 or substantially increased to make slight changes in the properties of the case in sizing material. In place of the borax I may use the chemically equivalent quantity of many other alkaline mate-rials, such as caustic soca, sodium carbonate, ammonia, sodium phosphate, or mixtures of alka-line materials.

The case in sizing material just mentioned is mixed with a sufficient quantity of clay and wa-ter, or similar materials, to form a mixture of the proper consistency for application to the web to be

- 20 coated. If a colored ground or coating is desired, a sufficient quantity of coloring material or pigment may be added to said mixture to produce a coating of the desired tint or color. A quantity of the casein sizing material is mixed with the
- 25 of the case in sizing material is material with who pigment or coloring material to be used in print-ing figures or patterns on the web. The proportions of the casein, clay or pigment, and water will depend upon the pigment and the kind of coating or printing desired, and is determined by \$0 experience.

I prefer to use as the agent for converting the casein-containing coating or printing material into a form substantially insoluble in water, a

- formaldehyde solution make by simply diluting with water the commercial forty per cent. solu-tion of formaldehyde. The proportion of water to be added to the solution of formaldehyde will depend upon the rate at which the converting 35 agent is to be delivered by the nozzles 13, the area to be treated per minute by the sprays, and similar factors. It has been found, however, that an aqueous solution containing from ½ to 5 per cent.
- of formaldehyde solution is most practical. It will be understood that, in accordance with my process, all materials used in both the coating and printing compositions contain a solution such 45
- as casein, capable of being converted into a form which is substantially insoluble in water, that the 50
- agent for converting such coating or printing into a form substantially insoluble in water is not used until after the coating and printing com-positions have been applied to the paper, and that the converting agent is sprayed on the final coat-ing or printing before the final drying. The con-
- verting agent converts the sizing material in the dried ground coating and the sizing material in the wet printing into a relatively hard film which makes the entire surface of the web washable. 60 The reaction between the sizing material and the
- converting agent to form this film, is accelerated by the heat in the drying rack, through which the paper continuously passes immediately after the spraying of the converting agent on the wet coat-65
- ing or printing while the paper is moving from the printing machine to the rack. This film possesses great water resistant characteristics. The converting agent is sprayed on the final coat-ing or printing at such a rate as not to flow or 70
- spread after application to a greater degree than to cover the web. An important feature of the invention is that, owing to the manner in which the converting agent is applied, the final coating 75 or printing is not disturbed, and it is not neces-

sary to dry the final coating or printing before the application of the converting agent. Any other protein adhesive which is or can be made easily water soluble and which is convertmade easily water soluble and which is convert-able by formaldehyde or related substances or by metallic salts may be used in place of the casein size. A solution of metallic salts may be used in place of the formaldehyde solution. It is to be understood that my process may be used in producing a water-resistant surface on substances other than paper, such as fabrics, that, 80

85 in so treating such other substances the sizing material and the converting agent will be applied in two steps, and that the converting step is to be carried out while the coating or printing is wet, as described. 00

I claim as my invention:

 A continuous process of producing a web of material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying a solubilized protein mate-rial to a surface of the web, printing on the treated surface with a pigment material includ-ទភ ing a solubilized protein material, and thereafter spraying the treated and printed surface of the web with a liquid capable of reacting with the protein material to form a water-insoluble com-100 pound.

2. A continuous process of producing a web of material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying a solubilized protein material to a surface of the web, drying the treated sur-face, printing on the treated and dried surface with a pigment material including a solubilized protein material, and thereafter spraying the treated and printed surface of the web with a liquid capable of reacting with the protein mate-rial to form a water-insoluble compound. 110

3. A continuous process of producing a web of material having a water-resistant surface, which material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying a solubilized protein material to a surface of the web, printing on the treated 115 surface with a pigment material including a solubilized protein material, and spraying the treated and printed surface of the web while the printing thereon is still wet with a liquid capable of reacting with the protein material to 120 form a water-insoluble compound. 4. A continuous process of producing a web of material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying a solubilized protein material to a surface of the web, printing on the treated 125 surface with a pigment including solubilized pro-tein material and thereafter spraying the treated

tein material and thereafter spraying the treated and printed surface of the web with a formaldehyde solution. 5. A continuous process of producing a web of 180

material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying to a surface of the web a comobsiding the solubilized case in the web a com-position including solubilized case in, printing on the treated surface of the web with a pigment in-cluding a solubilized protein material, and there-after spraying the treated and printed surface of the web with a liquid capable of reacting with the case in and the protein material of the pig-ment to form a water-soluble compound ment to form a water-soluble compound.

A continuous process of producing a web of 140 material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying to a surface of the web a composition including solubilized casein, drying the treated surface, printing on the treated and dried surface with a pigment material including a solubilized casein, and thereafter spraying the treated and printed surface of the web with a formaldehyde solution.

7. A continuous process of producing a web of 150

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material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises applying to a surface of the web a com-

- comprises applying to a surface of the web a com-position including solubilized casein, drying the treated surface, printing on the treated and dried surface with a pigment material including a solubilized casein, and thereafter spraying the treated and printed surface of the web, before the printing has dried, with a formaldehyde so-lution lution.
- 8. A continuous process of producing a web of 10 8. A continuous process of producing a web of material having a water-resistant surface, which comprises printing on a dry surface of a web including a solubilized protein material with a pigment material including a solubilized protein material, and thereafter spraying the printed sur-face of the robe with a liquid cample of mact-

A continuous process of producing a web of material, printing a design on a surface of the web with a material containing solubilized casein, and thereafter spraying the treated surface of the web, before the design has dried, with a liq-uid capable of reacting with the protein mate-rial to form a water-insoluble compound, where-hy smearing or snudging of the design is avoided. 85 by smearing or smudging of the design is avoided.

A continuous process of producing a web of material which comprises printing a design on 90 or material which comprises princing a design off a surface of the web with a material containing a solubilized protein, and thereafter spraying the treated surface of the web, before the design has dried, with a formaldehyde solution, whereby smearing or smudging of the design is avoided. 95



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Oral History Interview With Nancy Heugh Kansas City, Missouri June, 12 2006

Nancy Heugh is a Conservator and worked on the Truman Farm home in 1984. Nancy Heugh retrieved original wallpaper samples from the Farm and separated layers, assembled fragments into sheets where possible and encapsulated the samples for storage.

Extraneous conversation is not included.

Francis:	I just wanted to talk to you a little bit about the work you did at the farmhouse
Heugh:	Right
Francis:	And, if you can shed some lights in terms of some of the work that you did over there and that would something that would be practical to us.
Heugh:	Well, I think my, I worked with John Huffman who was the Architect at the time and it's in my conservation report, pretty much what I did to the pieces and so
Francis:	I've gone through that conservation report; there are just a couple of things I wanted to ask you about,
Heugh:	Yeah sure,
Heugh:	You didn't get copies of the articles of the newspaper?
Francis:	No I didn't
Heugh:	What did they give you?
Francis:	I got a set of your work right there.
Heugh:	yeah that's all?
Francis:	Yes, that what I
Heugh:	What is the nature of the questions you had for me?

- Francis: Well the nature of the dialogue was to revisit with you what your recollections were first of the farmhouse. When you went over there to do your research what was the nature of that house, what condition was it in, the wallpapers, that's what we are specifically interested in. The work that you did, what your general impressions were, your conclusions, that's all I wanted. And if you could give me a summary narrative of those that would be enough. Now if you have information like you said, like newspaper information that are written, that would be very helpful in our effort. I'm just trying to collect whatever primary and secondary information there are to enable the research that we are conducting that's what the nature of it is.
- Heugh: Ok, all right, well, when I went out there, I was hired by John Huffman, to look at the wall papers, because there was an understanding that there was a group that was going to restore the house and John Huffman was very concerned that the restoration be done properly. And, rather than just rip out the old wallpaper he had me come in and take samples and my work was to retrieve enough of each layer of wallpaper so that we could put together a repeat pattern. And, ah, possibly reproduce it if that's what the site chose to do. So, I worked during the winter by my self with a steamer and took the paper off the walls and went down a number of different layers in several rooms and then I separated the papers and took them back to my studio at the time and I separated all the layers of the paper. And I matched up the patterns with broken pieces and fragments and although they may not have been in the exact, the same pieces may have been in the exact sections, there were reproducing the, copying the original pattern I connected the lines of the flowers and so those were the sections that you saw. I think, I encapsulated them in them in Mylar sleeves and labeled them. And, there was not attempt to do a full preservation treatment on those samples that was the first phase of the project was completed, just to retrieve what we could. An additional step would have been to clean all the stains out of the papers and to re-back them and to do, you know fill holes and that sort of thing. That kind of conservation treatment was not pursued, it was just to retrieve the samples and assemble them to be handled and studied and that was the phase that I worked on. The house was under construction at the time and they were taking wallpaper off before John came in and had me do the work. He sort of called the halt to the dismantling of the rooms to give me time to go in and take the samples. I didn't take everything down there were certainly many pieces left that were demolished.
- Francis: So is it your recollection that during the time you worked in that building that there was some other construction activities going on there....

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- Heugh: Yes
- Francis: And that those construction activities kind of lead to the removal of some of the wall papers that you are not today aware of?
- Heugh: There might have some wallpaper that was removed before I started.
- Francis: And there is no way of knowing where those wallpapers were kept by somebody, or where we can get hold of those wallpapers?
- Heugh: I don't know about anything that was done during the construction process, I assume that it was just discarded because it was considered demolition at the time.
- Francis: Do you know the name of the construction company that was working during that time?
- Heugh: The man that, this was the carpenter that was doing it, his name was George Fogelsong. And this was the newspaper article about him that I was supposed to have a copy made for you. He was supervising the renovations at the time. So, I don't, it was all volunteers from what I remember. The are also architect records that the park service should have these, did you get copies of this? There are finish schedules all of this stuff that should be helpful.
- Francis: We will be calling the park service

The following refers to Nancy Heughs copied paperwork

- Francis: Please explain these to me
- Heugh: 1st page John Huffmans' business card and I wrote on here the phone number of George Fogelsong, he may still be alive, he was an older man at the time. The next group of three pages are my pencil notes from the project. From scraps of paper I have, this was my notes from when John Huffman first contacted me, he told me that it was original wall papers at the house there were 3.5 rooms from 1907 and I guess the house was built in 1905? I don't know quite what the interpretation of those dates would be right now. They started construction on the central part of the house and then they were going to I guess, 94-95 I don't know what that means, could be 1894-95.... I don't know the exact date of when the house was built. The original papers that were overlaid with other papers and some was painted. They wanted me to look at the interior walls, not sure what that other note says at the bottom. He wanted to hire me as a

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consultant to uncover the samples and he wasn't talking about restoring the wallpapers in place, he was talking about just taking samples. There was never any effort to restore the existing wallpapers; they were in such bad shape and so many missing parts that from the beginning they knew they would have to do replacement. There's some phone numbers. The Truman Home Foundation was apparently the organization that was the volunteer group that was taking care of the place, Jackson County. John Huffman did the preservation work at the Wornall house prior to this so he was trying to transfer some of the ideas and concepts from that approach to the Truman home. I think the sound deadening felt was a note he must have felt that something like that should be installed because everything was creaking. The last page, I just had this note, I figured out who this was, I wrote down Dr. Sobrest, but it was Ben Zobrist he's actually a client of ours, I don't know how well he is, he probably was involved at the time as a consultant on helping guide what this volunteer group should do, so his name may be one you may want to you know.

- Francis: OK
- Heugh: These next two pages were just notes of when I returned pieces, it's a list that I think I then typed up in my report. The first one was room 3 the parlor there were 2 large sections labeled 1-9. The second was number 4, the hall, the upper room large piece so that details the pieces that were returned, treated and returned. This next section are informational copies that John Huffman gave me regarding the grounds and history of the site and these were dated 1983, I'm not sure who drew them, but John Huffman has on the top that these were the nephews recollections of the layout of the farm. The second one is that, and then the third page; they are all dated November 1983. And the two sheets that were drawn by.... the archaeological people. This is the room schedule, the way they numbered the rooms and their plans to demolish the plaster and I don't know what the archaeological map was used for, but John gave me a copy of it.
- Francis: These are all the features outside
- Heugh: Yeah. And apparently this layout was from his nephew's memory, I don't know if the nephew is still alive or not. This was a letter he wrote to me and he wanted to bring me back in to help with the decision making on the final reproduction, whatever, but that never happened and he had sent me this copy of the article put out by the Cooper-Hewitt museum who has that wonderful collection.
- Francis: So these are the newspaper articles

- Heugh: We should be up to the notes on the second floor of the west room, it just give a description of what I saw initially that it was striped on top of the yellow flowers white silver pinstripes the vertical pattern and then I did that little drawing of some the little fragments I could see. This is just more notes, I think about the envelopes that I prepared to give back in the Mylar samples. This is a map, just notes of the plan of the room the way they were. I didn't have a identification for the rooms so I just labeled them labeled the first floor A-G and I think you can read it, should correlate with the other. This is more newspaper clippings that John sent me about the possible transfer to the Park service, of the house, which really doesn't relate to the wallpaper, its just historical. I don't know what the date is on this, must have been still in the 1980's. Here is the article on finding wallpaper reproductions, and then the other recent article I copied because I didn't know if you had seen it. Old house journal, and then here is the newspaper article about George Fogelsong who was the retired carpenter at the time, so this was1983, then it became kind of a obsession with him to go ahead and restore this place. But we thought this was all rather amusing in terms of preservation as a photo of him burning the lathe as he was restoring the place. So that's an interesting piece of history. And just for documentation, I included my invoice to show that I did the work and I got paid.
- Francis: OK
- Heugh: That's just generally what the extra stuff was in the files, my memories of the project are basically what I said that I worked on site, I don't know how many days to take the wallpaper down and I took it to my studio and cleaned it and patched it and when I gave it back to John, I didn't hear anything further. The volunteer group just moved ahead and did what they wanted to do anyway. The samples transferred hands a few times and then you know the stories about how they were found again, somebody saw them at a estate sale and recognized them. Then the park service acquired them.
- Francis: And that point I wanted you to clarify for me because there is a documentation of that whole episode that seems to contradict what I heard from the park service
- Heugh: Oh, ok
- Francis: Tylene Bautista I think was an intern that who worked on the papers that had been collected from the farmhouse. Wallpaper, and she had written this account and I wanted you to look at it, although it has been corrected,

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and its kind of contained in this paragraph that has been edited and I wanted you to clarify it for me a little bit.

- Heugh: So, now who is this person? A student?
- Francis: She is a intern student; from I think a company in NY.
- Heugh: And she did this on her own
- Francis: Yes, it was a term paper, but I think she worked for the Griffin Co.
- Heugh: Has Carol reviewed this?
- Francis: Yes, this is from the park service
- Heugh: Well first of all the staff did not go to great lengths to conserve. If it wasn't for John Huffman, they would have destroyed it. Because they were just going to tear it out and put in reproduction which is basically what they did anyway. And so, samples that I took were assembled and pieced together so that they could have evidence for reproducing the wallpaper. But, if you see in my original proposal there was supposed to be a phase 2of that project and I was supposed to do more work to clean those samples and de-acidify them and assemble them a little more accurately, so that there'd be more finish to them, so they didn't understand the whole concept of conservation and I did what I could do to just make the samples available without harming anything. In 1984 layers of wallpaper fragments were carefully removed from the home and stored in a box for future research, well yeah that's rather cursory, because they weren't just stored in a box, I did all that work on them. And then labeled them and returned them. AT the time I was independent of Heugh-Edmondson Conservation, I was on the staff at the Nelson Atkins Art Museum, but I had my own private business, just Nancy Heugh Paper Conservator and I did the work in the basement of my house, because I was not supposed to be doing that kind of work on the museum premises, so I worked at home. Not sure what this notation is. And these were lost, says this is not correct. OK. They acquired the property in, I don't know the date they acquired the property, I guess that's accurate, 1994, they acquired the property? OK. They didn't have the wallpaper samples then, what they had were black and white Xerox copies of the wallpaper which Carol has now. When I heard they had acquired the home property I said well do you have the samples and she looked for them and all she had were the black and white copies that I had removed and encapsulated, so that was lost at the time that they acquired the property, I don't remember the date, but it was misplaced then. This is true, Carol was aware there were

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missing samples and she called me late one Friday late in the afternoon and asked me if I had copies of your records. I said I don't know I'll see if I can find them and I asked her why and she told me that this estate sale was to happen on Saturday but that a volunteer and been going through the stuff and seen a folder labeled Truman Wallpaper Samples and in order to halt the sale of these things they had to have legal action and she said but we can't find the documentation that shows that they were ours do you have copies in your records? So I found my copies of the bill and this stuff and I faxed it to her late that afternoon. And so, from that they were able to have some proof that they had rights to the wallpaper and they were able to halt the sale of them the next morning.

- Francis: So you think that the edited account right here is more probably more accurate than the original narration of what happened?
- Heugh: Yeah, I would like to re-write that phrase for you if you intend to use that information somewhere, because I would like to say that they were removed, and the process to preserve them for immediate use to reproduce the wall coverings and also to be available for future research but it was more than just storing them in a box.
- Francis: Would you want to do that and fax it to me? Just that account right there.
- Heugh: OK, I didn't know the name of the person. Were these Carols notes?
- Francis: Yes.
- Heugh: Did Carol provide a date of when they did acquire the wallpaper when that auction, that estate was?
- Francis: No, I have to visit with her on that account.
- Heugh: Yeah, find out when that was because, sometime in the 90's, late nineties, so this is probably wrong, if it had only been lost for 5 years, it was probably 15 years it had been lost something like that. And the staff of the farm home, they never did any work on researching and dating the samples. So she is referring to my samples, the five areas?
- Francis: I think that's what she's referring to.
- Heugh: Five areas, well, I think there were 9 samples, aren't there 9 packets, that my list says.

- Francis: Yes, that's what your lists says, yes. So I'm gonna try to reconcile your list and that documentation right there.
- Heugh: Now some of them may not have been the oldest wallpapers, I had them all layered, some rooms I put together samples of several layers, as I recall, some may have been the 2nd layer some one might have been the 1st layer. Actually could you, I'd be willing to read this too and if you could send me a copy.
- Francis: I'll make a copy and send it to you.
- Heugh: Because it might trigger a memory of things. These are photographs that she took of our stuff.
- Francis: Yes.
- Heugh: This must be from fragments that weren't encapsulated. Yeah this is interesting, when did she do this last year?
- Francis: Yes that's the date on it. So I'm going to make you a copy of it.
- Heugh: With Carols notes and I can..... OK. I had no idea that someone had really done that kind of research, so you're lucky you've got a lot of information already done for you.
- Francis: Ok well I appreciate your, you know your effort this morning and I'll make a copy of this and send it to you.

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Oral History Interview With Betty Dawson Grandview, Missouri- Truman Farmhouse December 6, 2006

Betty Dawson was the coordinator of the Truman Farm Home Foundation overseeing the home maintenance and volunteers and is currently a seasonal ranger at the Farm Home. Mrs. Dawson has been associated with the home in some capacity since 1980.

Italics are from memory of conversation. Extraneous conversation is not included.

- Francis: How did you come to be associated with this place?
- Dawson: ??? said he was taking a vacation for two weeks and would I cover for him. I said I did not know anything about how to run the operation of the house, I had been a volunteer only, he told me to come over and he would show me the ropes. My husband said, I think you have just gotten your self a job. This was the first job I ever had. When two weeks were up, I called him, and he said, I'm not coming back. So, that's how I really became involved.
- Francis: The Truman Home Foundation owned the home correct?
- Dawson: No, the Foundation never owned the home, it had about five owners since 1980, friends of the Truman's purchased it allowing the Trumans' to get it back. Then, with the aid of a grant the foundation purchased it in the eighties, but it was deeded to the county. It was agreed that the Foundation would run it and maintain it for the county. When the Foundation could no longer maintain it, the home passed to Jackson County. After the county then the National Park Service acquired it.
- Francis: Could you tell us what was happening to the home before 1980?
- Dawson: It was empty for a while, before that I understand that it was rented.
- Francis: Do you know who the renters were?

Dawson: No.

Francis: Could you tell us what you recall about the home before the renovations began?

- Dawson: It was in bad shape, a lot of mold and mildew and the paper was hanging off the walls, the place was empty.
- Francis: Do you recall anything about the wallpaper?
- Dawson: No, I really don't.
- Smith: Do you remember which rooms had wallpaper; did this room (dining room) have it?
- Dawson: There was no wallpaper in the kitchen or dining room when I toured the home before the renovations began. I remember the paper hanging down in the Hallway here, see the picture here. (Newspaper: Jackson County Advocate Newspaper. Grandview, Missouri. Harry S Truman May 3, 1984.)
- Francis: These photographs were taken prior to the renovation?
- Dawson: Yes.
- Francis: This newspaper, may we borrow it?
- Dawson: I don't know if I have another one, the Park Service, Carol, should have some, I gave her a bundle of them.
- Francis: We would give it back to you....
- Dawson: Hum, I don't really want to part with it, I don't know if I have another copy at home.
- *Francis:* OK. Could you go over again the ownership of the home, you said there were about five owners.
- Dawson: Yes, the house was vacant, I remember driving by with my husband and seeing a for sale sign on the property. They lost the farm in the 40's and then, the Truman's bought back a small portion of the original lands- it was 600 acres, now we have about ?, The Truman's rented it from about the mid-fifties. Then the Harry S Truman Farm Home Foundation worked to get it. The Park Service did not want anything to do with it at first. Jackson County owned it and the foundation renovated, operated and maintained it. When the Foundation could no longer support it, it reverted back to the County, then....??? Finally the National Park Service took it.

- *Francis:* Thank you, now, you don't remember anything at all about the wallpaper, how it looked?
- Dawson: (Hallway) I remember the paper hanging off the walls, I really don't remember what it looked like. I do remember that it was hanging off the wall over the door and all along the stairway.
- Francis: What else do you remember?
- Dawson: I know that George Fogelsong worked for over a year to make it like it used to be when the Truman's lived here. He said he owned the Truman's, I don't know why. They carefully collected a box of wallpaper samples, it was lost for a while. But it was found at an estate sale of Ruby Jane Hall.
- Smith: Mrs. Dawson, how did they pick the wallpaper that we see in the rooms now?
- Dawson: Mr. ?? contacted some child hood friends of the family and the women picked out the papers that closely resembled what they remembered when they visited as children.
- Dawson: The Truman family and people have donated all of the artifacts in the home, none are original from when Truman actually lived here, but they are all of the period. The hole in the floor is for heat to come up from the parlor to this bedroom- Grandmas bedroom. During the time when the Trumans lived here. The kitchen and dining room walls were painted. Harry's bedroom was in the back. This was Harry's bedroom, he shared it with his brother, Vivian. It was called the little room under the eaves by some authors. There was no stove up here. Man, it was cold! Truman used to say it was cold enough up here to crack the enamel on your teeth.
- Francis: And, again this wallpaper here kinda like of the memory of the people that visited this place?
- Dawson: So, the Truman's had farmhands and he did, there were cots up here and they did share the room with some of the farm hands, yeah, there again the placement of the furniture is pretty much way the family members remembered it. But Dr., I mean, Neil Johnson a retired archivist at the Truman Library, he is the fella now that portrays Harry Truman at a lot of things around the city. Neil did oral histories of all family members during the time the renovation where going on. So that they could get everything as right as possible in the house. Yes, he is retired now but

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he's living out there in Independence and he's another good person to talk to, yeah..

- Francis: Do you think Neil Johnson know anything about the wallpapers?
- Dawson: He and his research and like I said oral histories are all on file at the Library, have you been through them?
- Smith: I did not see an oral history about the farm, but maybe I did not ask that, I will ask again.
- Dawson: Check with Liz Safly, I know Neil did it after I became involved, Neil was still working at the library and I met with him several times at the office to try to get a handle on things out here when I was suddenly trying to take care of. Yes, and I have copies at home he made me copies of so me of the oral histories he done with various family members now I don't know that there is anything in there specifically about wallpaper, it might me be but I'm not sure. They should be at the library.
- Smith: I'll check
- Dawson: And George, poor George Fogelsong, he died. I know George's family gave a lot of George's paperwork, now I'm trying to think whether he gave it to the National Park Service or he gave it to the Library, but I don't know.
- Francis: Well, I'm interested in looking at some of the things that <u>you</u> have, is there any way I can look at them?
- Dawson: Well, I ah..... I've got the ah, over the years I've got quite a file. I could ah, you know write down you guy's address where you're at, and I could possibly, I'm with the Red Cross in Kansas City. So I get there quite a bit. And so, I'm trying to think what I got oral history wise. I know I've got copies cause Neil made them for me. Talking with the nephews, Vivian Trumans' sons and their wives. But, there again, in getting to specifics that dwelled a lot on the wallpaper, I kinda doubt it. Unfortunately the people are dead.
- Francis: Yeah, I just want to see what it is for example this newspaper right here, there is those pictures that kind of reflect a little bit of the wallpaper so you never know what I'll see um, its kind of interesting to know...

- Dawson: I think Neil would be, yeah, give him a call, tell him what you are doing, tell him I suggested it.
- Francis: Do you know how we can get in contact with Neil?
- Dawson: He lives in Independence; he's in the phonebook. Neil Johnson. He would be a good one to talk to. His number is 373-6347. Neil M. Johnson. 15804 E. Kriger Circle, 64055. He is a retired archivist for the library and the Park Service did have the ???? book, but they ran out of it. But there is nothing in there about wallpaper, but it is a neat little book, Robert Ferrell's book. (Harry S. Truman: His Life on the Family Farms by Robert H. Ferrell, High Plains Publishing Co.) Robert Ferrell's other book, the big fat one, Dear Bess, those are poem letters they found in the attic in home in Independence when Bess died. They go into a lot of specifics too, but see there again, reading all of that stuff and finding the little line that relates to what you guys are looking for.... The Park service should have copies of the newspaper, a big stack was given to them. I don't know if I have any copies at home. I don't whether I helped you much or not.
- Francis: I think you did a good job, I sure appreciate it, alright. Please tell me you name again.
- Dawson: Betty Dawson....D-a-w-s-o-n. I've been with the home, last summer be 20 years, in one way or the other.
- Francis: We sure appreciate this thing, and when this report is written you will be given you so compliments you deserve.
- Dawson: Double check your facts, that's the only thing, in reading everything I have about Truman, one author will same one thing and another will so something else about the very same subject.
- Francis: Sometimes that's how research works, proofread and cross check the facts
- Dawson: Yes, proof read, that's the word I'm searching for.
- Francis: Somewhere, in the middle of the story you will find the truth

Following our phone call this past week I am sending you a few written comments about the wallpaper in the Truman House.

With the help of volunteers and interns we have looked through all relevant resources within the Wallcoverings Department including sample books, collection objects and binders of advertisements. Unfortunately we did not find any direct matches with those in the Truman House. However there were close similarities with several of the designs. In the 1950s I believe manufacturer's still changed their entire line every 2 years. These papers were most likely produced and purchased shortly before hanging. As mentioned above I have a lot of resources available for the 1950s but much less for the 1960s and 1970s to track the 2 kitchen papers.

All of the papers selected by the Truman's are on the conservative side with very traditional designs. The 1950 decade was the last great era for wallpaper use in the United States. After the war there was a major emphasis by manufacturers to show papers that were new and fresh to revive lagging sales. There was a large variety of papers available including artist-inspired designs, kitsch, boomerang and crystalline shapes.

I would guess, with the exception of the Lancastria paper, all were produced in the United States. They also all appear to be machine printed. Based upon the design and the pattern repeat sizes I would guess all fall within the medium to medium-low price range. The paper marked "Lancastria Line" was produced by the Wallpaper Manufacturers Ltd. in England. I don't have dates on when this line was being produced.

Just a comment on the border paper used in "207 Guest Bedroom". These narrow borders were quite popular during the 1950s. We have a group of over 100 of these borders in our collection. There is one design almost identical to your stripe with the brand name of Duro-Stripes. Produced by the Duro Decals Company these borders cost 25 cents for a 12 foot length. Other almost identical borders were made by the Trimz Company, a division of United Wallpaper.

Papers purchased from the local hardware or paint store could have come from any number of manufacturers active across the country.

The only other place I can suggest for additional information is the Sears, Roebucks archive, especially if the Truman's had a history of shopping at this store. This is the only company producing mid-range papers that is still around and maintains an archive. The contact information is Sears, Sears Merchandise Group, 3333 Beverly Road, Hoffman Estates, IL 60179. You can send it to the attention of Archives, Public Affairs Dept.

I am sorry I can't give you more specifics. If you have additional questions please let me know. Also, with your permission, I would love to keep this packet of information for my research file on historic homes.

There is a note stating: "Used in Museum Room in 'Magnolia Grove', Greensboro, Alabama, birthplace of Rear Admiral Richard P. Hobson" which I assume means this paper is a reproduction of the original found in that house. That is all the information I have on this piece. I received your photos.

This wallcovering was made in our Hanover, Pennsylvania plant.

The type of printing is called Surface Print.

It gives you a hand painted look and feel, as if the artist hand brushed the design on the wall.

The background color was applied via a rotating cylinder with brushes protruding out of it.

Sort of like a rotating porky pine, so to speak. Without knowing the exact date of manufacture, there is a possibility the background color could have been applied by air knife. A machine that cuts the coating with air, a newer technology.

But only close observation will determine that point.

After coating was applied, it now needs to be dried.

he paper went down a steam heated drying rack with the paper draped over wooden dowel rods separated about every 6 inches. Picture a wash line back to back, every 6 inches, for about 120 feet.

But only about 35 inches wide. In the wallcovering industry, this is called festooning.

The paper came back and then entered our Waldren Printing Press, the newest of which was built about 1895. Most are older that we own. They are still functional today. The inks are all made in house, at that time

mostly consisting of casein, that is horse glue. Which was standard.

The paper then received a alum wash or coating that insolubilized the casein. Sort of like what happens when you drop a egg in hot water to

make a pouched egg for breakfast. The result is, the ink sticks like a

grass stain on white pants. You just can't get it out.

This technology offered high adhesion strength, but very little

flexibility. The pigments were mostly earth tone

minerals of the day. Like chrome yellow, red oxide, green oxide,

titanium dioxide (white), brown oxide,

and perhaps some dyes or lake colors (barium sulfate crystal that have been dyed blue or red).

I have a video tape that takes you through the entire process.

There have been many improvement, but the process is essentially unchanged.

I was Eisenharts chemist for some 20 years, and I now own them.

I was trained by the old timers but formally educated as a engineer with all the modern technology.

I have a video tape that takes you through the process done by PCN, Public Cable Network, which aired over cable a few year ago.

This is just off the cuff so to speak, but it is a little info for you.

Incidentally, we also were the manufacture of wallcoverings for President Ronald Reagans boy hood home in Dixon, IL. President Reagan requested us to remanufacture

the exact wallpaper in his boyhood home

br the purpose of restoring that home to its look when he was a youngster there. It was high lighted in his 1984 presidential run for

office. We flew to Dixon and retrieved samples to duplicate it exactly.

Thats all for now.

Wallcoverings Company. And that the printing was done on a SURFACE PRINT MACHINE. Our machines are 100 years old now, or more. There is virtually no one in the world who has such machines anymore.

This is a artistic art form that may soon be lost to the ages.

I can think of only 2 other companies who do a little of this anymore.

I have worked here over 18 years as chemist and Asst. VP.

I am in the midst of trying to finance the purchase of the company, as it has filed bankruptcy. But it has been difficult. I was hoping for some funding from the government or the Arts. This is a piece of history if not saved, will be lost forever. I trying.....

It may also interest you to know, that we produced the original wallcoverings and then reproduced them again for renovations in their boy hood homes for Presidents Nixon and Reagan.

For Reagan, we reproduced his entire boyhood home in honor of his 1984 reelection campaign.

Our wallcoverings are hanging there today as they did in their youths.

Hello;	

My best guess is that the wallcoverings were manufactured in the late 1940's to early 1950's.

My reasons are that on one of the samples

there is a back stamping by us indicating it was union made. The unions became quite strong after WW II and their mark on the back was no doubt of a collective bargaining requirement of this time frame. Also the styling is rather reminiscent of this period. In addition, the green color on one sample indicates the use of chrome or lead based pigments, which were scarce during the war. The other color being white, which indicated the use of titanium dioxide, also suggests after WWII, as the titanium was in great demand for air craft bodies.

I hope this helps. Now, perhaps you could help me.

Do you know of any grant money to help me save this company?

The operation and equipment is over 100 years old.

The art and history here is phenomenal.

The artisans techniques and the entire process is at steak here. This company survived 2 world wars, the great depression and some 20 plus Presidents. What can be done?

Any way good luck with your project.


