

During our visit to Nashville a volunteer group and their Park Watch Program enlightened us. The group called themselves Friends of Warner Park. This volunteer group was represented by dozens of individuals that are active in Warner Park. By volunteering their time to this organization they help Park Rangers monitor activities in the park. The park consist of everything from beautiful landscaping to a golf course, trails, a Nature Center, historical buildings, and an equestrian facility for horse competition and training. Friends of Warner Park use radios and cell phones, to communicate to Park Rangers about unusual occurrences in the park, and to report suspicious individuals. This group is very busy in the community and in the parks. They educate park patrons regularly about the wildlife and the environment that they help patrol. They also are involved first-hand in some maintenance items in their park. Picking up trash and cleaning up is a regular occurrence. The planting and restoration of many trees and plants are of a rare commodity that is cherished by the park district.

One area of interest to many of us in the park law enforcement field was the supplemental funding that this volunteer group had come up with to help the Park Ranger Program. Many of our volunteer groups across the world do a great job of fund raising for our parks, but this group was committed to the enhancement of the Warner Park Rangers. The Park Ranger Program, consisting of the Metropolitan Nashville Park Police, who are assigned to the Park Ranger

Patrol, are very professional and consequently dressed very well. Their Mounted Patrol Unit is an eye catcher for any that see it. The Friends of Warner Park actually helped purchase some equipment and uniforms needed for this mounted unit. They also played an active role in creating the law enforcement patch on the Rangers uniformed shoulders.




