General

Travel: Visitation at Cape Hatteras continues to increase. Total visitation was 185,541, an increase of 14.6% over July, 1962. Day use facilities were crowded, and undesignated campgrounds were utilized on many days. Camper use has increased 16.5% for calendar year to date. Swimmers using the lifeguarded protected beaches totaled 27,350; and an estimated 17,000 used unprotected beaches.

The Atlantic-Ocracoke ferry was loaded to capacity on all trips.

Visitation at Wright Brothers totaled 65,042, an increase of 10% over July, 1962.

An increase of 23.7% in visitation over 1962 was recorded at Fort Raleigh. Included in the 39,557 visitors to this area were 21,900 admissions to "The Lost Colony".

Special Activities: Chief Park Naturalist Black represented the superintendent at a planning meeting for the 1963 Wright celebration. Others present included Messrs. Ralph Whitener, Wade Marr, Miles Clark, John Fox and Aycock Brown.

The Roanoke Island Historical Association designated July 12, 1963 as NATIONAL PARK SERVICE NIGHT. Director Wirth was introduced from the stage of the amphitheater at intermission of "The Lost Colony" symphonic drama, at which time he made a talk on behalf of the National Park Service.

Historian Roush attended part of the North Carolina Historic Coastland Association meeting on July 12, which was held at Fort Raleigh. State Senator P. D. Midgett, President of the Association, presided.

Superintendent Myers attended the meeting of the North Carolina Board of Conservation and Development on July 15 and 16. A special report was made of this meeting.

The superintendent and assistant superintendent visited the Fifth Coast Guard District in Portsmouth, Virginia, on July 26, to make a courtesy call on Admiral Wuensch.

Administration

Personnel: Christopher F. Gaskill was promoted from Foreman II (Maintenance) to Foreman III (Maintenance), Ocracoke, effective 8-4-63.

Safety and Health: Park vehicles were involved in two accidents.

Life Guards performed 36 rescues; all of minor nature and generally involved children.

There were three injuries to cast members of the concession-operated drama, "The Lost Colony".

The USGS began test well drilling operations on July 15 at Fort Raleigh in order to evaluate the water potential for future developments in that area.

Tests made by the USGS at Wright Brothers during the month revealed a significant chloride increase in the domestic water supply. The chloride concentration is now well above USPHS recommendations, and if further increases are detected, corrective action must be taken.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: The Ocracoke shipwreck exhibit was completed and installed. An admatic program for orienting visitors was installed in the Ocracoke Visitor Center. A site has been selected for a future nature trail on Ocracoke Island.

A lift-top interpretive box was fitted with a text and erected near the wrecked "Altoona" at Cape Point. Interpretive personnel installed a tight floor and a cupboard heating element in the projection booth at the Cape Point amphitheater. Maintenance personnel added several rows of seats and repainted the screen and projection booth.

New slides replaced faded ones in the admatic at Bodie Island Visitor Center. Also, temporary exhibits of special interest were displayed at this visitor center.

Figurines for exhibit at Fort Raleigh have been received.

One message repeater cabinet in Wright Brothers Visitor Center has been modified by installing a push button switch on the top of the cabinet to actuate the tape talk.

Interpretive Services: Visitor attendance at interpretive programs has increased considerably over July, 1962, as indicated by the following tabulation. Decrease at Wright Brothers is due to more accurate count.

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Research and Observations: The first fall migration of birds began to be apparent early this month. Black terns from the north appeared here about July 4, followed by sanderlings about the middle of the month.

Unusually dry weather has lowered ponds severely, concentrating aquatic life. Terns of several species fed at the Museum of the Sea pond daily during much of the month, eating small trapped fishes.

Seasonal Naturalist Francis Mitchell found a stranded bottle-nosed dolphin on the beach 8 miles south of Rodanthe on the 31st. It had been injured in some way; ostensibly bitten. He returned it to the ocean, but after some swimming, it was again stranded. Photographs of Mitchell and the dolphin were taken by Mrs. Mitchell.

On July 8, 150 snowy and common egrets were observed on the Bodie Island Lighthouse pond. Approximately 50 glossy ibis were observed in a group in a Bodie Island marsh July 30. Glossy ibis appear to be a commonly observed bird now.

The mosquito population continued at a low level, causing only slight annoyance.

Dr. J. Gerard Rey, botanist and zoologist, Montreal, Canada, was at Fort Raleigh studying the flora and fauna of this area.

Protection: One citation and seven written warnings were issued; numerous oral warnings, the majority involving the gathering of plants. Directing traffic, searching for missing children and assisting campers in locating a spot to camp were other time consuming duties.

Visitors seeking information continue to stop at headquarters for their first contact.

Four hundred mail inquiries were answered.

The problem of delivering emergency messages to campers consumed considerable ranger time. Lost and found reports processed totaled 41.

Protection personnel and local law enforcement officers received four hours practice on the firing range.

Forest Fire Protection: Slip-on units in all districts were operated and checked. Three small fires were suppressed by Buxton personnel. A bombardier and attached fire plow was purchased and located at Bodie District. The chief ranger, district ranger and shop mechanic have been given instructions and field practice in the operation of this equipment.

Building Fire Protection: The annual building fire inspection was made in all districts and reports prepared. All extinguishers were checked and recharged where necessary. Three fire drills were conducted at Buxton to acquaint all personnel in the efficient operation of fire suppression equipment. Fire equipment in all other districts was operated.

Fish and Wildlife: Charter boats operating from Oregon Inlet have boated a record number of billfish. However, other species normally taken have been unusually scarce; this includes dolphin, amberjack, king mackerel and tuna.

Maintenance: An air circulatory fan and louver were installed in the memorial structure at Wright Brothers in an attempt to reduce moisture condensation.

Burgess Brothers Painting Contractors, Portsmouth, Virginia, began work July 29 on their contract for painting the exterior of 16 various buildings on Bodie and Hatteras Islands.

Concessioners: The chief park naturalist gave a special talk to members of "The Lost Colony" cast to help train them for information service work.

Resource Planning

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Representatives of the National Park Service, the State of North Carolina and the Federal Aviation Agency met at Wright Brothers on July 8 to discuss plans for the construction of the airstrip.

Cooperating Non-Government Agencies: Gross income for ENP&MA items was \$1,763.74. On July 16, Miss Dana A. Roderick began work as sales clerk for the Association.

Members of the protection division have joined and are attending monthly meetings of the local Peace Officers Association.

Rangers on Hatteras Island are active members of the Hatteras Volunteer Fire Department.

Public Affairs

General Publicity: Old weather station building in Hatteras Village sold to local group by NPS; "Lost Colony" has biggest first night; many other special nights ar pageant; North Carolina's Historic Coastland Association formed in meeting at Fort Raleigh; Director Wirth speaks during intermission of "Lost Colony" at NPS night; campers actually spend considerable money in vicinity of National Seashore; radio "hams" organize to commemorate work of radio pioneer Fessenden on Roanoke Island; tourist travel to National Park Service installations on Outer Banks well ahead of last year; archeological excavations at Fort Raleigh will begin on August 20; airstrip to be constructed at Wright Brothers; and reproduction of 1903 Wright Brothers flying machine for visitor center.

The current issue of the North Carolina Historical Review, carried a review of Mr. Harrington's "Search for the Citty of Raleigh".

Design and Construction

Plans, Maps and Surveys: Preliminary plans were received for the Cape Hatteras entrance sign and for an addition to the Bodie Island equipment storage building.

Construction surveys continue at the Salvo and Frisco Campground sites.

New Construction: B-42 Hydraulic Fill - Little Kinnakeet: Complete.

B-47 Mosquito Control Pilot Project: Contract for construction portion completed. A two-year contract for the study of ecological changes began July 1 with North Carolina State College.

B-45 Dune Study Project, Technical Supervision and Research: A two-year research study began July 1, under Dr. Per Bruun of the University of Florida.

B-41 Acquisition and Authentication of Elizabethan Room Paneling, Fort Raleigh: Acquisition has been completed; paneling has been stored at Colonial National Park, Yorktown, Virginia until construction of the Fort Raleigh Visitor Center begins.

B-44 Beach Erosion Control and Stabilization: Contract work completed. Day labor forces continue grassing and fencing newly constructed dunes on Bodie and Hatteras Islands. Aerial application of fertilizer will begin in October, 1963, and continue through June, 1964.

B-52 Construction of Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds, Utilities, Checking Stations, and Comfort Stations: Contractor is securing equipment and materials - work to begin in very near future.

B-53 Construction of Two Residences at the Cedar Glen Residential Area, With Utility Connections: Work underway - footings for one building in place.

R-11 Construction of Roads and Parking Areas for Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds: Included in contract for buildings and utilities; grading work underway at the Salvo site.

Storm Damage Reconstruction: B-46 Pea Island Repairs: Comfort station has been relocated, repaired, and opened for use. Work continues on water supply system.

B-34 Comfort Station Rehabilitation, Storm: Relocation work complete. Refinishing work by day labor forces delayed due to heavy visitation.

B-23 Beach Erosion Control and Stabilization: Grassing, fencing, and fertilizing work continues on Ocracoke Island.

R-8 Reconstruct Roads and Parking Areas: Work complete except for curb and walk repairs on Bodie and Hatteras Islands.

R-10 Construct Directional Signs and Markers (105): Work continues by Park personnel.

General

Weather was ideal for beach activities.

Travel: Visitation for August was the greatest ever recorded for a single month at Cape Hatteras. Overflow camping areas were utilized on several occasions.

At Cape Hatteras, total visitation was 215,634, an increase of 44.3% over August, 1962. Total visitation for the year to date is 690,711, an increase of 32.5%. Visitation for the calendar year to date has exceeded that for the entire year of 1962.

Fort Raleigh had 52,646 visitors, and 122,666 for calendar year to date. This is an increase of 22.8% for the month and 23.2% for the calendar year. From June 1 through Labor Day 33,504 visitors paid admission to Fort Raleigh; total fees collected amounted to \$8,376.

Wright Brothers had 70,759 visitors, an increase of 10% over August, 1962.

Special Activities: Regional Chief of Visitor Protection Gordon Bender arrived on the 19th to review the ranger services program for all three Service areas.

Members of the protection division attended the monthly meeting of the Dare County Law Enforcement Officers.

The History Exhibits Planning Team, consisting of Staff Curator John Luzader and Visual Information Specialist Daniel Feaser, arrived here on August 20 to work on an exhibit plan for Fort Raleigh. They left the area August 30.

~~Miss~~ Rita Matthews, Secretary to the Director, visited Cape Hatteras Headquarters on August 22.

On August 22, Mr. Huntington Cairnes and Mr. Frank Stick made a call on Superintendent Myers. During the visit, the beach erosion control program was discussed.

Assistant Regional Director Marshall was here the greater part of the month preparing for and attending a two-week term of Federal court in Manteo. The purpose of this session of court was to settle title claims at Cape Hatteras which have been pending for several years. Assistant Regional Director Lisle was here August 26 and 27 to attend a two-day session of these hearings.

On August 28, Assistant Superintendent Rundell attended a meeting of the Southern Albemarle Association in Belhaven, N. C. Dedication of the Oregon Inlet Bridge was under discussion and the month of April was tentatively set as the time to hold the principal bridge dedication.

Administration

Safety and Health: One motel guest drowned while swimming in the surf at an unprotected beach near Buxton. One camper broke a leg, and one was bitten by a dog. Other injuries to visitors included embedded fish hooks, splinters, and cut feet.

The lifeguards made three rescues.

The USGS completed test well drilling operations at Fort Raleigh and Wright Brothers.

Mr. Paul Henderson, USPHS, inspected water and sanitary facilities of the park from August 20-26.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: A preliminary plan for display of the reproduction of the Wright 1903 plane has been submitted for consideration.

Mr. John S. Attinello called on the superintendent to discuss plans to get the 1903 reproduction in Wright Brothers Visitor Center and assembled.

The superintendent and staff members met with Mr. Sweet, representing the Soaring Society of America, to pick a location for the plaque to be presented during the 60th Anniversary Celebration at Wright Brothers.

Interpretive Services: Attendance for interpretive services increased over that recorded for August, 1962. Manpower has not been sufficient to provide the services that visitors expect.

Research and Observations: Regional Chief of History and Archeology Harrington conducted an archeological investigation for development of Fort Raleigh sites under consideration. Results of the survey were negative.

Park Historian Roush gave some assistance to William S. Powell who is writing a history of the Roanoke Island Historical Association.

A blackfish was found freshly stranded about 3 miles north of Buxton on the 29th. Mouth injuries suggest that it bit a boat propellor in mistake for a fish.

At least three European little gulls were seen from the point of Cape Hatteras on the 19th. Rare, but regular elsewhere on our Atlantic coast, they are a new record for this park.

Long drought has kept pond levels very low throughout the month, making shore and water birds scarce and hard to see. It has also withered blooms on many flowers and delayed ripening of sea oats, beautyberries and golden aster, among others. Nodding pogonias, a small orchid on the Buxton Woods Nature Trail, had withered blooms; but orange adder-mouth and crane-fly orchid seemed unaffected by the drought.

A sea turtle was observed laying eggs in the sand on the beach at Nags Head, 12:30 a.m. to 2:00 a.m., August 6.

Dr. Dave Adams conducted research on the vertebrate animal population in the Pilot Mosquito Control Project.

Protection: The ranger division answered 211 mail inquiries. Five citations for motor vehicle violations were issued. Two visitors were cited for disorderly conduct. One vehicle operator was cited for reckless driving on the beach; this action was instituted upon complaint of a local motel operator who will testify. In addition to the citations, 15 written warnings for various violations were issued. Duties included processing lost and found reports, searching for missing children and delivering emergency messages.

Bodie Island rangers assisted local officers in the apprehension of a car theft.

Conversion of the Cape Hatteras Radio System is underway.

Forest Fire Protection: Pumper units in all districts were operated; necessary repairs made on the Buxton unit. One small grass fire was extinguished by Buxton rangers. The Ocracoke pumper unit was used for control of fire at the village trash disposal area.

Building Fire Protection: Fire trucks on Bodie and Hatteras Islands were operated; storage rooms were cleaned. Couplings and adapters for Fort Raleigh were received. This equipment is to convert the Fort Raleigh system to conform with the Manteo Fire Department and the Bodie Island District equipment. An emergency fire plan was prepared by the Hatteras District ranger. Two fire drills were held for maintenance and protection personnel on Hatteras Island. A fire drill was held for key personnel at Ocracoke.

Fish and Wildlife: Surf fishing increased the latter part of the month. Blues, flounder, spot and a few channel bass were the predominant species. August produced the finest Gulf Stream fishing of the season. A record number of billfish were boated.

Some black ducks and mallards were using the managed hunting area on Bodie Island.

Maintenance: Burgess Brothers Painting Contractors completed the exterior painting of 5 buildings on Bodie Island, and began work on the 11 buildings on Hatteras Island to be painted under their contract. A purchase order was issued to this company during the month to clean and paint the old Coast Guard flag tower at Chicamacomico.

Concessioners: Unusually heavy visitation plus excellent fishing resulted in heavy use of the Oregon Inlet Fishing Center. Rangers were on duty each weekend to help control traffic. Charter boats operated to capacity all month.

August 18, the anniversary of the birth of Virginia Dare, was designated as Dare County Day; no fee was charged at Fort Raleigh. An informal art exhibit was held under the rain shelter in the Waterside Theatre. At 3 p.m., near the fort, a tree planting ceremony and raising of the flag, "The Cross of St. George", was held, with Ambassador from New Zealand, Mr. Laking, as honorary guest. Mr. Laking also spoke at intermission of "The Lost Colony" performance that evening.

Resource Planning

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: District Ranger Baum attended a meeting at Coast Guard District Headquarters to discuss a plan concerning enforcement activities on prevention of smuggling and illegal entry.

Public Affairs

General Publicity: Mr. Tom McAvery, free lance photographer, visited Wright Brothers to get information and pictures for an article to appear in Aero Space Digest. Mrs. Jean Geddes, writer for "Northern Virginia Sun", Arlington, Va., also visited the Memorial to get information for an article to appear in that paper.

Design and Construction

Plans, Maps and Surveys: Construction plans and specifications were received from EODC for the construction of a Mechanical-fill DiKE at Cape Point. Park personnel began a topographic survey at the old Buxton Inlet area for the proposed beach nourishment program.

A boundary survey was conducted on Hatteras Island under a negotiated contract with Mr. Bob Kramer from Elizabeth City, North Carolina.

Engineer Mecislavas Rumbaitis from EODC was here the week of August 19 in connection with the Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds construction.

New Construction: B-47 Mosquito Control Pilot Project: Contract for construction portion completed. A two-year contract with North Carolina State College for the study of ecological changes began July 1.

B-45 Dune Study Project, Technical Supervision and Research: A two-year research study began July 1, under Dr. Per Bruun of the University of Florida.

B-41 Acquisition and Authentication of Elizabethan Room Paneling, Fort Raleigh: Acquisition has been completed; paneling has been stored at Colonial National Park, Yorktown, Virginia, until construction of the Fort Raleigh Visitor Center begins.

B-44 Beach Erosion Control and Stabilization: Contract issued August 23 to Lincoln Construction Company, Wilmington, North Carolina, for the construction of a mechanical-fill dike at Cape Point (6400 lin. ft.). Work underway. Day labor forces continue with grassing and fencing newly constructed dunes on Bodie and Hatteras Islands. Aerial application of fertilizer will begin in October, 1963, and continue through June, 1964.

B-52 Construction of Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds, Utilities, Checking Stations, and Comfort Stations: Work underway at Salvo -- pilings for two comfort stations in place.

B-53 Construction of Two Residences at the Cedar Glen Residential Area, with Utility Connections: Work continues - foundations for both buildings complete.

R-11 Construction of Roads and Parking Areas for Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds: Included in contract for buildings and utilities; placing of marl base begun at the Salvo site. Grading underway at Frisco.

R-12 Construct Landing Strip for Small Planes (one-third total cost for strip) and Construct Landing Strip Entrance Road and Parking Area, Wright Brothers: State of North Carolina opened bids on August 20 for construction. Lincoln Construction Company, Wilmington, North Carolina, is apparent low bidder.

R-13 Construct Entrance Road and Parking Areas (portion), Fort Raleigh: Archeological investigation underway.

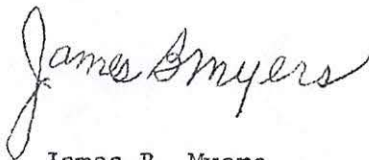
Storm Damage Reconstruction: B-46 Pea Island Repairs: Comfort station has been relocated, repaired, and opened for use. Remaining work on water supply system to be completed in fall.

B-34 Comfort Station Rehabilitation, Storm: Relocation work complete. Refinishing work by day labor forces delayed due to heavy visitation.

B-23 Beach Erosion Control and Stabilization: Grassing, fencing, and fertilizing work continues on Ocracoke Island.

R-8 Reconstruct Roads and Parking Areas: Work complete except for curb and walk repairs on Bodie and Hatteras Islands, which is to be accomplished in fall.

R-10 Construct Directional Signs and Markers (105): Work continues by Park personnel.

General

September was unusually cool and precipitation above normal. Tornado warnings were issued on the 29th.

Travel: Visitation at Cape Hatteras for the month was 67,660, an increase of 30.6% over September, 1962. Visitation for the year to date totals 758,371, an increase of 32.3% over 1962.

Wright Brothers had an increase of 4.6% and 9.4% for calendar year to date.

Fort Raleigh visitation decreased 9.4% this month as compared to September, 1962; however, visitation for the year to date has increased 24.9%. This visitor count includes 56,685 admissions to "The Lost Colony" symphonic drama.

Visitors: Mr. and Mrs. Ted J. Reardon of the White House staff; Mr. Theodore R. Swem and Mr. Joseph L. Orr, WASO; Park Naturalist and Mrs. Robert Whistler, National Capitol Parks; Senator and Mrs. Kyle Gray, Louisville, Kentucky; Mr. James H. McCormick, New York City; 115 members of the Flying Farmers of America on convention to the Outer Banks and toured Wright Brothers; officers from many allied powers participating in a special warfare school at Fort Bragg, N. C.; Mr. and Mrs. Joe Holloway, United Press International, Raleigh, N. C.; Mr. Peter Kendall, announcer with the Voice of America, Washington, D. C.; Park Ranger E. S. Nett, Gettysburg National Military Park; Mr. and Mrs. Gaylord Godwin, United Press International, Washington, D. C.; Superintendent M. O. Anderson, Independence Hall.

Special Activities: On September 11, Dr. Per Bruun visited Cape Hatteras to inspect erosion at Buxton-Cape Point area. Dr. Bruun was here in the capacity of consultant and he advised that the proposed dredging project be both a dike reinforcement and beach nourishment job, and that the sand bulge in the beach south of the lighthouse be removed because it is acting as a groin and is a contributing cause for the erosion southward. Dr. Bruun also inspected the field plots relating to the experimental work on the mechanics of dune building.

Members of the Protection Division attended the monthly meeting of the Dare County Law Enforcement Association.

The Management Improvement Committee met on the 24th.

The chief park naturalist represented the superintendent at a meeting of the Dare County Tourist Bureau on September 25.

Miscellaneous: A picnic for permanent and temporary employees was held at Coquina Beach September 28. Photographs are attached to this report.

Park Historian and Mrs. Roush attended a banquet given in Raleigh by the North Carolina Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives for Star Students and their parents on the 9th.

Historian and Mrs. Harris, while on annual leave, visited Cape Cod National Seashore, Gettysburg National Military Park, the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia and the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

Administration

Personnel: The following promotions were effected:

District Park Ranger Jack E. Stark was transferred to Glacier National Park, effective 9-22-63.

Mrs. Frances H. M. Akers was reinstated to Career appointment as Secretary (Stenography), GS-4, effective 9-8-63.

S. Preston Smith was given a Career Conditional appointment as Park Guide, GS-4, effective 9-10-63.

Rudolph C. Francis was reinstated to Career appointment as Electrician, effective 9-15-63.

Safety and Health: A safety film, "Fact Finding, Not Fault Finding", was presented at safety meetings on Bodie and Hatteras Islands.

Two visitors suffered injuries requiring medical attention. One visitor died of a heart attack.

Sanitary inspections were made of all concession operations, and conditions found satisfactory.

Messrs. Hugh Wilder and Ken Hunsucker, USGS, visited the area 24-27 to check drawdown recorders on Bodie, Hatteras and Ocracoke Islands.

Maintenance personnel began checking all heating systems for safe operating conditions prior to putting them into operating use for the winter season.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: All exhibits in the visitor center at Wright Brothers have been cleaned. Work has continued on the picture files at Wright Brothers to bring them up to date. Pictures have been taken of most of the exhibits in the visitor center at Wright Brothers for record purposes.

The Cape Point Amphitheater was dismantled and removed to save it from the encroaching ocean.

Rehabilitation of the Buxton Woods Nature Trail was started.

The interpretive marker for the Laura A. Barnes shipwreck was removed for the season.

Revisions for the 1964 printing of the Cape Hatteras folder were submitted to the regional office.

Interpretive Services: Visitation dropped abruptly after Labor Day. Most elements of the seasonal interpretive program were discontinued September 2.

Research and Observations: Migratory waterfowl are reported to be arriving early this year.

A number of dead birds have been picked up around the walks next to the Wright Brothers Visitor Center. They were apparently killed as a result of flying into the plate glass windows of the visitor center.

Protection: Lifeguard equipment was cleaned and stored. Specific regulations for conduct and duties of life guards were prepared.

Six written warnings were issued for traffic violations. One defendant was convicted of reckless driving on the beach. This case was important in establishing a precedent for future legal action on operation of motor vehicles on the beaches.

There were 106 mail inquiries answered.

Change over of radio system is proceeding satisfactorily.

Forest Fire Protection: Fire tool racks were constructed for Bodie Island. Hatteras rangers extinguished a Class B fire near Avon. The Rodanthe pumper unit was repaired.

Members of the North Carolina Forest Service observed the operation of the recently acquired bombardier and fire plow. They were impressed with the efficiency of this equipment.

Slip on units in all districts were tested.

Building Fire Protection: Pumper units at Fort Raleigh and Ocracoke were tested. Fire trucks at Bodie Island and Buxton were road tested. All hydrants on Bodie Island were flushed and hoses were checked. Ranger Kreis attended an eight-hour structural fire course dealing with extinguishers, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Wildlife and Fish: Fishing from charter boats declined as summer species of fish began to leave. Surfcasters began catching fall species, including spot, whiting and channel bass.

Preparations for the 1963-64 hunting season began during the month. Dates for hunting are November 7 through January 15.

During September there have been several instances of large numbers of tree swallows (*Iridoprocne bicolor*) killed by traffic on the park entrance road. This annual slaughter has been observed for the past three seasons. The birds settle on the road by the thousands and then fly up when cars come along only to have many of their number killed. There have been as many as 75 to 80 counted in one spot.

Concessioners: Discussions are under way concerning new and improved services at the Oregon Inlet Fishing Center.

The last performance of "The Lost Colony" was September 1. The Roanoke Island Historical Association reported the largest attendance in several years.

Maintenance: Mr. A. H. McDill, Jr., Regional Chief of Maintenance, arrived on September 30 for a week's visit to evaluate maintenance operations.

The Cape Point comfort station, building No. 317, was salvaged during the week of September 9, when the site was threatened by serious beach erosion. By September 30, the site was completely eroded away.

Mosquito fogging operations were discontinued for the remainder of the season.

Burgess Brothers, painting contractors, completed all work under their contract for painting the exterior of 16 buildings on Bodie and Hatteras Islands, and the painting of the Chicamacomico tower.

Resource Planning

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Last minute details for the construction of the airstrip at Wright Brothers were discussed at a meeting in the visitor center with representatives of the National Park Service, the Federal Aviation Agency, the State of North Carolina, and Lincoln Construction Company of Wilmington, N. C. Actual construction began September 30.

Public Affairs

General Publicity: Mr. James H. McCormick, free lance writer of New York City, visited Wright Brothers to gather material for an article on the 60th Anniversary which will appear in the travel section of the "New York Times" later this year.

UPI writer and photographer Joe Holloway, Raleigh, N. C., visited Wright Brothers to take pictures to accompany an article on the Wright Brothers which will be carried in many newspapers throughout the country in December.

An interview on the history of the Wright Brothers was taped by Mr. Peter Kendall with Historian Harris. The interview will be aired later in the year over the "Voice of America".

Design and Construction

Plans, Maps and Surveys: The proposed Master Plan for Fort Raleigh was received from EODC for comment.

Construction plans were received for the Cape Hatteras National Seashore entrance sign.

New Construction: B-47 Mosquito Control Pilot Project: Contract for construction portion completed. A two-year contract with North Carolina State College for the study of ecological changes began July 1.

B-45 Dune Study Project, Technical Supervision and Research: A two-year research study began July 1, under Dr. Per Bruun of the University of Florida.

B-41 Acquisition and Authentication of Elizabethan Room Paneling, Fort Raleigh: Acquisition has been completed; paneling has been stored at Colonial National Park, Yorktown, Virginia, until construction of the Fort Raleigh Visitor Center begins.

B-44 Beach Erosion Control and Stabilization: Contract issued August 23 to Lincoln Construction Company, Wilmington, North Carolina, for the construction of a mechanical-fill dike at Cape Point (6,400 lineal feet). Approximately 1,000 feet of dike in place. Day labor forces continue with grassing and fencing newly constructed dunes on Bodie and Hatteras Islands. First aerial application of fertilizer was applied the last week in September. Three more applications to follow.

B-52 Construction of Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds, Utilities, Checking Stations, and Comfort Stations: Work underway on buildings. The four comfort stations enclosed. All campsite equipment has been purchased.

B-53 Construction of Two Residences at the Cedar Glen Residential Area, with Utility Connections: Work continues - both buildings enclosed.

R-11 Construction of Roads and Parking Areas for Salvo and Frisco Campgrounds: Included in contract for buildings and utilities; placing of marl base completed at the Salvo site. Grading nearing completion at Frisco.

R-12 Construct Landing Strip for Small Planes (one-third total cost for strip) and Construct Landing Strip Entrance Road and Parking Area, Wright Brothers: Clearing work underway.

R-13 Construct Entrance Road and Parking Areas (portion), Fort Raleigh: Archeological investigation completed.

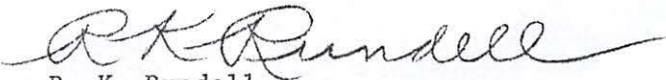
Storm Damage Reconstruction: B-46 Pea Island Repairs: Comfort station has been relocated, repaired, and opened for use. Remaining work on water supply system to be completed in fall.

B-34 Comfort Station Rehabilitation, Storm: Relocation work complete. Refinishing work by day labor forces delayed due to heavy visitation.

B-23 Beach Erosion Control and Stabilization: Grassing, fencing, and fertilizing work continues on Ocracoke Island.

R-8 Reconstruct Roads and Parking Areas: Work complete except for curb and walk repairs on Bodie and Hatteras Islands, which is to be accomplished in the fall.

R-10 Construct Directional Signs and Markers (105): Work continues by Park personnel.

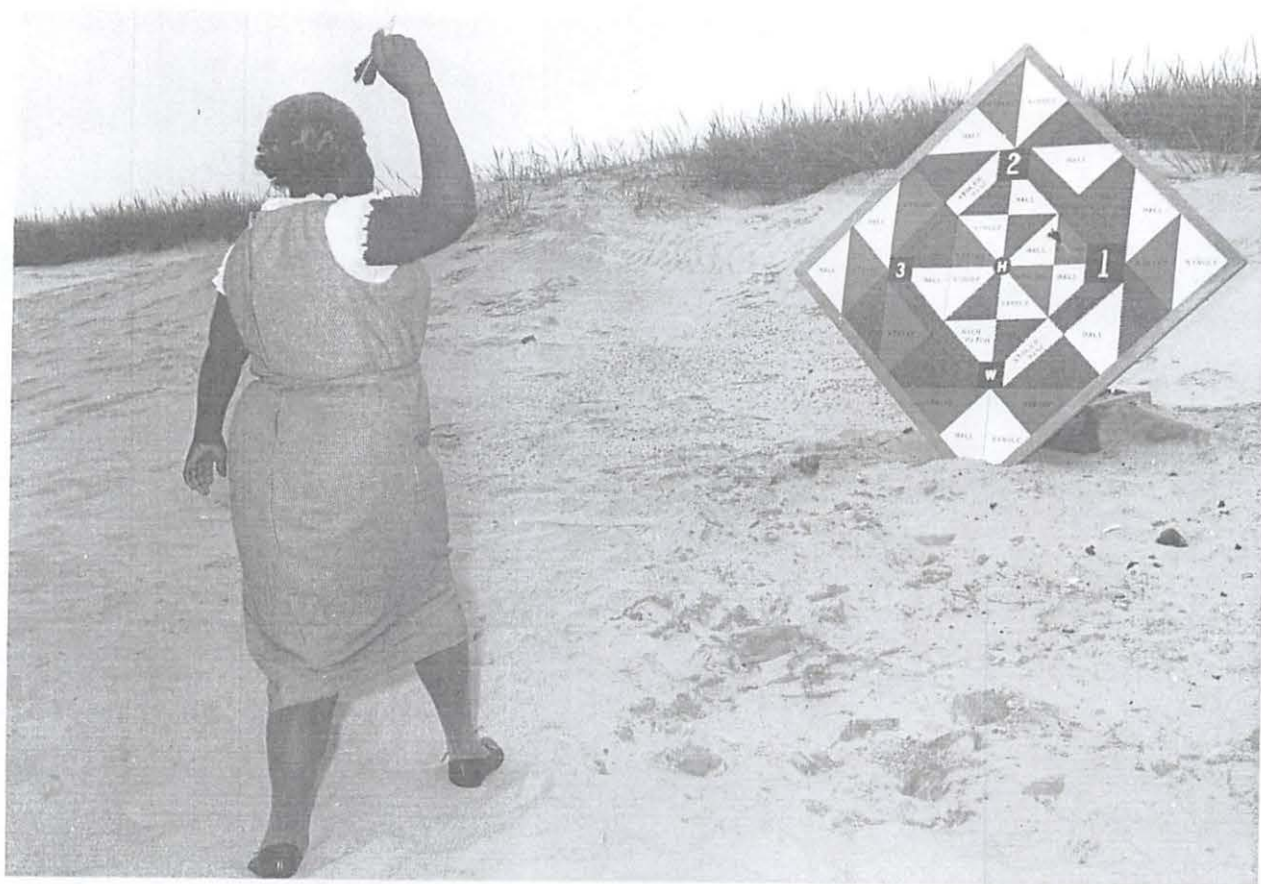
