

SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MOUNTAINEERING REPORTS

from

Areas Administered by the National Park Service 1968

Annual Mountaineering reports were received from Black Canyon; Organ Pipe Cactus; Chiricahua; Colorado and Devils Tower National Monuments; Harpers Ferry National Historical Park; Crater Lake; Lassen Volcanic; Mount McKinley; Sequoia and Kings Canyon; Yosemite; Mount Rainier; Glacier; Grand Teton; Rocky Mountain; Grand Canyon; and Zion National Parks.

Climbing Activity

IN REPLY REFER TO

Mountain climbing activity in the National Park System increased dramatically this year. The attached supplement lists mountain climbing activity by area. In the areas reporting there were 19,908 recorded ascents in 1968, compared with only 10,541 recorded in 1967. Generally good weather in the areas showing increases may be partially responsible, however, such a rise undoubtedly has additional causes unrelated to normal visitation increases and good weather.

Search and Rescue Activities

A statistical chart is attached to show search and rescue activities by area. In summary, there were four searches of consequence, one airplane crash, seven rescues due to illness, 15 non-climbing related accidents and 41 climbing related accidents, 48 of the persons involved survived the incidents, 31 did not. In 15 instances persons rescued were able to get out under their own power after being removed from a stranded position or administered first aid. Thirty-seven involved evacuation on foot for at least a portion of the distance. Five evacuations utilized either horses or mules and ll were air lifted out of the back country. In the 41 accidents relating to climbing activities there were nine fatalities, 25 injuries and nine strandings requiring rescue for a total of 43 persons. 1967 figures record 16 people killed and 27 injured while climbing. Although this shows a decline in climbing related accidents the areas reporting made up for it with an increase in other backcountry rescue operations. Yosemite was the hardest hit of these areas with nine miscellaneous accidents resulting in six fatalities and three injuries in addition to 21 climbing accidents causing six fatalities, eight injuries and eight strandings.

It should be noted that only the information involving climbing activities and accidents is valid for Servicewide statistical use. Incidents involving other backcountry problems such as lost persons, miscellaneous accidents, illness, and air crashes also occur in areas which have no reportable mountaineering activity. Since in 1968 these areas made no report, the figures for these other categories are not Servicewide figures.

Training

Servicewide approximately 6,450 man-hours of training were received by Service personnel on mountain rescue techniques. Instructors were obtained from Service areas and cooperating agencies. Of special note were a one week interregional winter mountaineering school presented at Rocky Mountain National Park in March, a Medical Emergencies and Winter Survival School in January at Mount Rainier, and two September schools in which five Park Rangers received training at Banff National Park in Canada on Mountaineering and Mountain Rescue. In addition to the climbing aspects of mountain rescue, Rangers from Rocky Mountain and Mount Rainier participated in advanced training in medical treatment at Denver and Seattle hospitals respectively. Such skills as intravenous shock therapy and the use of morphine for treatment of pain were taught and incorporated into the parks' rescue capabilities.
