Big Morongo Canyon Preserve

Nestled in the Little San Bernardino Mountains, the desert oasis at Big Morongo Canyon is one of the largest cottonwood and willow riparian (stream) habitats in California. During storms, water draining from the surrounding mountains can become a river that flows through the preserve and down the canyon. But year around, ground water from snow-covered Mt. San Gorgonio rises up along the Morongo fault to create a marsh habitat, a great attractor for all kinds of wildlife.

The Preserve is an internationally-recognized birding site. Several rare species nest here, and a great variety of birds stop here during the spring and fall migration seasons. It is an eBird hotspot and has been designated as one of the United States' Important Bird Areas.

With elevations ranging from 600 feet on the canyon floor to 3,000 feet at the top of the ridge, this diverse 31,000 acre landscape incorporates both the Mojave and Colorado desert climates. The land is owned by San Bernardino County and the Bureau of Land Management. In 2016 it was incorporated into the Sand to Snow National Monument.

The Preserve is operated by the Friends of Big Morongo Canyon Preserve, a non-profit staffed largely by volunteers and funded mostly by small donations from visitors.

Trail Status

Marsh 500 ft closure near Mesquite Trail junction	0.65 mi • 1 km	Easy
Desert Willow All open	0.75 mi • 1.2 km	Easy
Yucca Ridge One way. Closed at Mesquite Trail junction	0.72 mi • 1.2 km	Moderate
Mesquite Open only from Marsh to Canyon Trail.	0.5 mi • 0.6 km	Easy
West Canyon All open	0.84 mi • 1.7 km	Moderate
Canyon All open	4.9 mi • 13.4 km (Each way)	Moderate

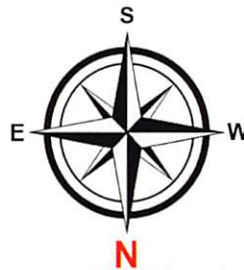
TRAIL MAP
