The photographs in this report were taken on March 17 at the time I accompanied Assistant Regional Director E. M. Lisle to Harpers Ferry where we met Assistant Director Conrad L. Wirth and Assistant Chief Historian Herbert E. Kahler. Subsequently we attended a dinner at Harpers Ferry which was attended by Governor Patteson, Congressman Staggers, and approximately 130 other people from nearby communities in West Virginia, Virginia, and Maryland. The purpose of the meeting was to promote establishment of Harpers Ferry National Historic Site.

These pictures were snapped very hurriedly in the course of a brief visit to part of the proposed park area. There was no time to make a selection of views to report on particular areas of interest.
