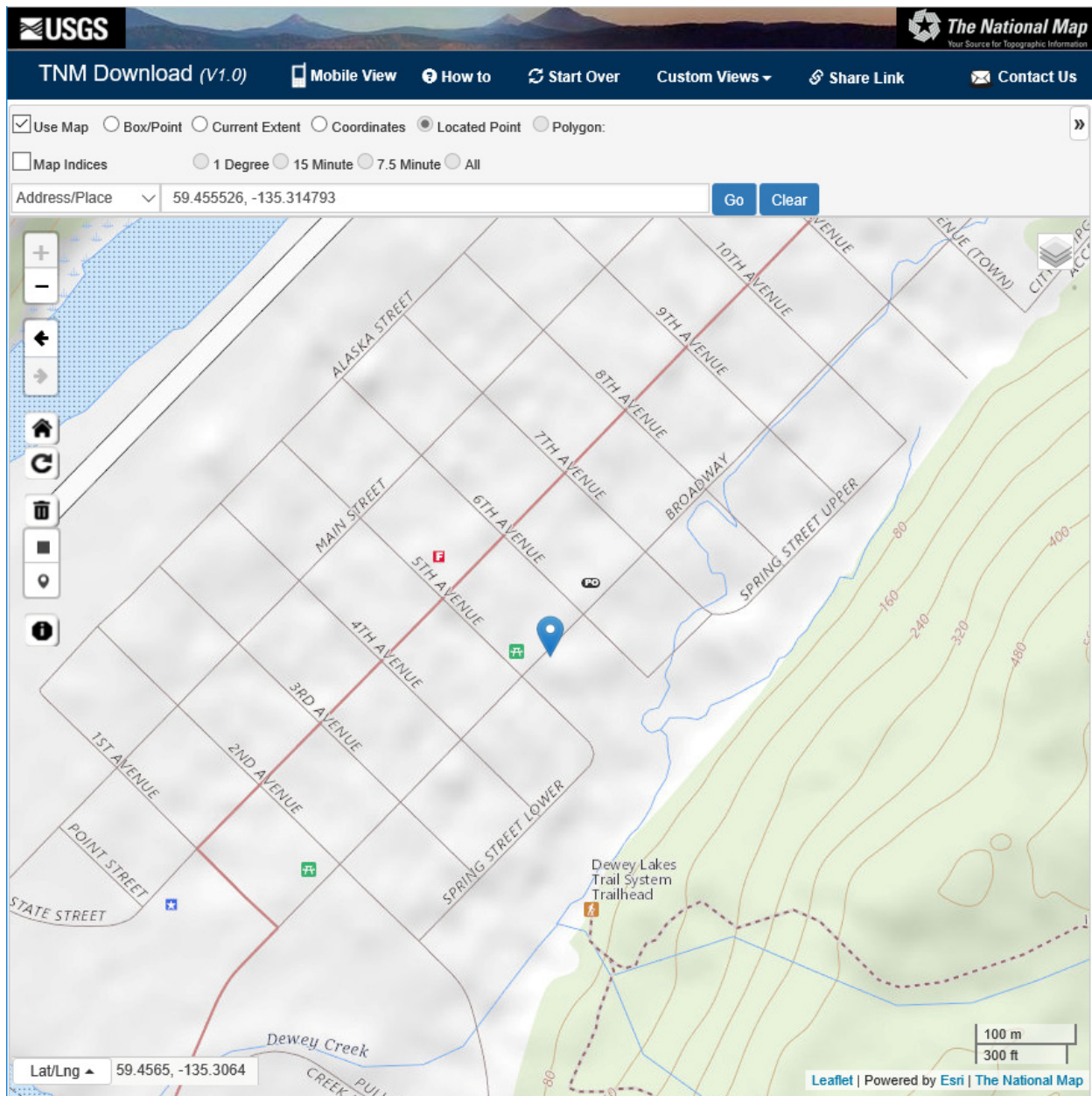

West (front) facades of the Boss Bakery (right) and the Goldberg Cigar Store and Confectionery (HABS AK-283) (left). The Boss Bakery was built in 1897. It has a false front with a cornice return, belt course, transom windows, and a recessed entry. Plate glass storefronts on either side of the entry are framed by pilasters and recessed base panels. The bakery was originally built on the east side of Broadway between 4th and 5th Avenues (Lot 6, Block 25). The building was moved to its current location in 1979.
