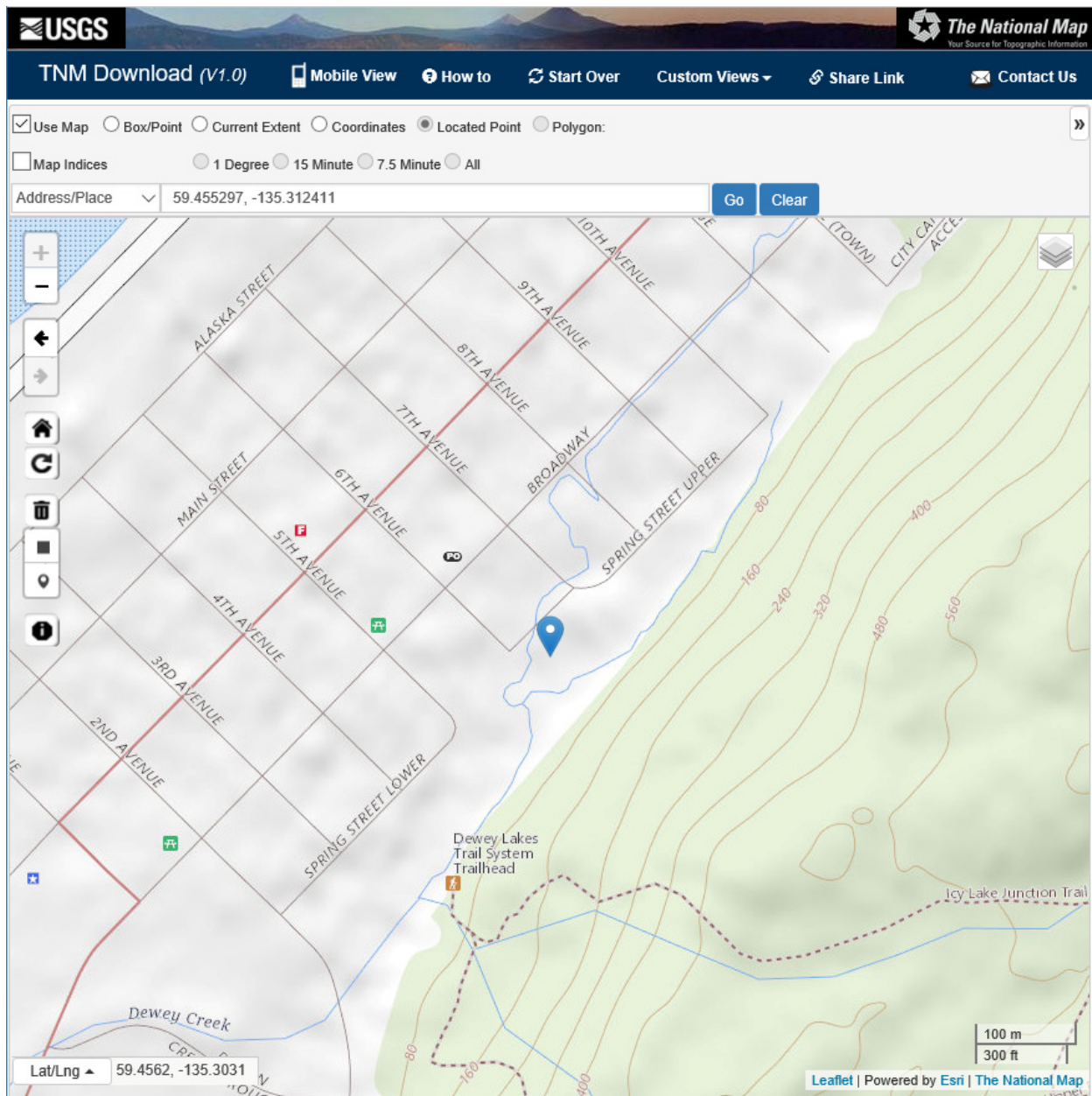

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| AK-287-1 | Harding Monument, view looking south. When President Warren G. Harding visited Skagway in 1923, he and his entourage lodged at the Pullen House. The stone monument was installed in his honor, most likely after his visit. The space where a metal plaque was installed is visible on the north side of the monument. |
| AK-287-2 | Pullen House chimney, view looking northwest. The Pullen House chimney was added between 1916 and 1918 on the west side of the Pullen House hotel. "PULLEN" is spelled out in a rock mosaic below the mantelpiece. The chimney is the last standing remnant of the Pullen House hotel. |

The Pullen House Ruins are located at longitude: 59.455297, latitude: -135.312411. This point represents the east side of the stone chimney (the only extant part of the house). It was obtained by Jen Larsen, Biological Wildlife Technician & GIS Specialist, Klondike Gold Rush National Historical Park, in August 2019 working with historical building spatial layers within ArcMap (NAD83).
