Thank you for the assistance I have received from our Federal Government in connection with my attending the government-sponsored Foreign language Institute at the S. F. State College in San Francisco, 6-25 - 8-18, 1962.

I have been taking the Russian Institute under the able care of Dr. Axelrod and his able assistants. Among them are: Mr. Bratov, Mrs. Gavrilovich, Mrs. Madison, Mrs. Slapirko, Mr. & Mrs. Sorokine, Mr. Lapinov, Mr. Dots, Prof. Roman, Prof. Beguny, and many others - in the laboratory, in the office, in the restaurant and in the Merced Hall Dormitory. S.F. State is wonderful and so is San Francisco. The beautiful native speakers

with us, or, taking us to the wonderful restaurants for native meals - all of all of these wonderful people have helped me to improve my knowledge of the Russian language and now I would be able to teach it much better than I did up to now.

Besides attending this wonderful Institute one had the pleasure of meeting the language instructors from all over the country.

My family lives in Minneapolis and I know that they gladly spend their vacations without me knowing that I am studying and am able to send them the check that our U.S. government has so graciously given to me.

Thank you again, Dear Senator.

And now, I have another question to ask you:

(1). How and where can I find the information concerning the early Ukrainians

immigrant, the Reverend Agapieus

HONCHARENKO, who came to S.F.

in 1867, was the editor for the "Alaska-Herald" and who died in 1918?

(2). What could be done to preserve his historical grave on the privately owned ranch at Hayward, Calif.

(3) What could be done to allow the local S.F. Ukrainians to have a legal access to that grave and how can we rebuild his and his wife's broken crosses when the farmer threatens us with a rifle?

(4) Such unpleasant situation occurred only day before yesterday when the group of the participants from St. Michael's Greek Orthodox Church and Bill Strobel of the Oakland Tribune have tried to visit the precious historical graves.

inclosure. This is in accordance with your communication of August 27, 1952, in which you requested that we furnish information concerning the grave site of the Reverend Honcharenko. By direction of the Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings and Monuments has repeatedly gone on record as being
opposed to the Federal Government assuming responsibility for burial places of even very prominent men in our national affairs.

The question concerning providing access to the grave site for local Ukrainians of the San Francisco area will have to be resolved at the local level in negotiations with the owner of the ranch or by determining the legal rights of access to the grave site.

B: As for assembling information about the Reverend Honcharenko, that is a question of research in family, local, and census records, which must be the responsibility of the persons concerned.

We are returning Mr. Lucio's letter. We regret that we are not in a position to be helpful in this case, but appreciate your courtesy in writing to us about this matter.
