show the underlying traies of their characters. Finally snow inspeed them in the Sientas. There were desperate efforts to cross the pass, efforts to survive there by Truckore Lake; from the other side of the pass there were francic attempts at resoue. Forty-six people got through alive.

Going back to original sources, consulting the diaries of the survivors and other concemporary documents, retracing on foot much of the way the Donner Parry followed, Mr. Sorwart has written the definitive account of a story that has assumed the proportions of a folk epic. It is a story that runs the compass of man's nature: almost incredible deverion and self-sacrifice, and greed equally incredible; cowardice and heroism; perm squabbles rising to a hate that could persist in the face of a common death; stupidity, arrogance, courage, even a certain grim humor; above all dogged endurance, the will to live driving across obstacles of pain, of want, of frozzing and burning, and even that last tenrible necessity, the eating of human flesh, and by sheer power of the human spirit winning through to life.

Or all the overland journeys to the West, pushably that of the Donner Party has most deeply possessed the American imagination. It is not hard to understand why, for the happenings of that journey stripped away the standards of civilized life, and lad base in terrible simplicity the elements of human behavior.

In 1846, before the gold rush had so well bearen out the Western rusil, some eighty-seven people—men, women and children—with their wagens, starred for California. They were lare in the pear, midded by Hassings' directions, they sook a new, hand rouce; they stranged across the desert, losing most of their castle and nearly dying themselves of thirst.
