MAY 1219 Just I want to thank you (a) for the invitation to the Air MAY CENTEROLLUTION Conference (b) for your courtesy in having me as your MAY 1219 Just at the Conference banquet and (c) your enthusiastic endorseproposed national monument and statue of democracy.

> I had a very satisfactory conference with Mr. Demaray, Mr. Drury, (?) and others. The theme, the treatment and the general idea received their very favorable comment, as no doubt has been reported to you.

> Discussion of the possibility of seeking token contributions for the monument from other democracies brought up the question of protocol. As a result I had - through the courtesy of your office - a very pleasant call on Mr. Spruks, assistant protocol officer of the State Department. Mr. Spruks declared there was nothing involved in the proposal calling for checking with or supervision by the State Department.

I found Drew Pearson most sympathetic to the idea and appreciative of its world-wide significance. He expressed the idea that fund raising might meet with some regional or provincial jealousy and offered some appreciated suggestions about a national sponsoring committee - a matter I already had in mind. He said he would be glad to give it recognition when the project gets farther along.

I am now directing my thought to the practical problem of raising funds.

I am not clear what your response was to my suggestion that you be honorary chairman of the sponsoring committee. I wish you would give me the assistance of your name in that capacity. If "protocol" forbids it, can you give me a letter giving the idea your blessing?

Any plan that is perfected will have full safeguards for all funds raised and all expenditures. Perhaps I can get one of the leading financial men to serve as treasurer. Il you be free to offer any suggestions?

My best wishes go with you and the President in these coming days.


